way with 1,143 deer Lincoln roportod. County is second with 1,111 deer followed by Giles County 1,106, Fayette County 1,083, and Henry County 1,001.

Since archery season began in late September, 151,449 deer have been harvested statewide, which totals 933 less over the same period from last year. However, this

year's second segment total surpasses last year's mark of 26,179 deer heading down the stretch. The top five overall counties heading down the stretch and their harvest for this year are Giles County (4,788), Henry County (4,543), Fayette County (4,235), Hardeman County (4,192), and Lincoln County (3,964).

Young For the

Sportsman Hunt, only youth ages 6-16 may participate regardless of whether they possess a junior or adult license. Each youth must be accompanied by a non-hunting adult, 21 years or older, who does not need a license but must also wear 500 square orange.

Youth hunters, ages 10-16 need a hunter education card along

with the appropriate license(s) and/or permits. Those hunters, ages 6-9, are not required to possess a hunter education card or license. These hunters are required to have their Social Security number to check in a deer.

For those youth inches of fluorescent hunters, ages 10 and older, who have not taken the hunter education course, the Apprentice License is available. The Apprentice License exempts a hunter, age 10 or older who falls within the hunter education requirement, from having to complete the mandatory Hunter Education Course for one year.

The grant program, created in 2000, is designed to provide critical funding in support of fish and wildlife species that are rare or declining. Miles presentation will explain Tennessee's use of the State Wildlife Grants, the first significant funding to manage and conserve non-game fish and wildlife in our state.

A Native American Heritage presenter, Sky Wolf, of the Over Hill Cherokee Nation of the Cherokee Descendants, will present a program featuring Native American Heritage in the Hiwassee River area at noon.

The American Eagle Foundation is scheduled to present a live raptor show at 1 p.m. and features some of the many birds of prey rehabilitated by their team after being found injured across the nation. Some of the birds cannot be released back into the wild and are part of the American Eagle Foundation's show at Dollywood in Pigeon Forge.

Starting at 2:30 p.m., local traditional music expert, Tom Morgan, will hold a "hands on" session for kids where the children may hold and play various traditional musical instruments. At 3 p.m., Morgan, Lynne Haas, and Ray Branham will play some of the old traditional songs that include western and bluegrass influences. The 2nd Nature Band from Nashville will perform at 4 p.m. and end the activities at the school.
