

promotion of methamphetamine manufacturing, simple possession of schedule II controlled substance, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Lisa Irene Hafley, 45, Chestua Road, Madisonville was charged with failure to appear out of Monroe County.

According to records, Officer Kevin Condee, LCPD responded to Walgreens Friday evening concerning suspicious persons purchasing pseudoephedrine. When the officer arrived on scene, he observed a man and woman matching the description leaving Walgreens and getting into a green Jeep Cherokee.

The officer stopped the jeep as it attempted to leave the parking lot. The driver, Dennis P. Moore,

was advised of his Miranda Rights and then questioned about the reason for his pseudoephedrine purchase.

Moore admitted to buying pseudoephedrine, but said it was for a cold. Mr. Moore's passenger, Lisa I. Hafley, also bought pseudoephedrine.

Moore gave the officer consent to search the vehicle. A plastic baggie corner, containing two

pills, identified as oxycodone, one unidentified pill, a metal case containing a razor blade, plastic cards, and portions of drinking straws with powder residue inside them were found in the center console.

There was also aluminum foil in the console, which is a known precursor in the manufacture of methamphetamine.

A box of cold medication containing pseudoephedrine was found in the passenger floor board and a package of four Lithium batteries was discovered hidden in the springs underneath the driver's seat, another known methamphetamine precursor.

Officer Condee transported Moore to the Loudon County Jail. Officer Allen Bean, LCPD transported Hafley.

Griffis

According to an affidavit filed by Detective Jonathan Sartin, LCPD; on or about May 19th, 2011, Detective Sartin found out Mr. Griffis moved on May 16th, 2011 from 308 West 5th Avenue, Lenoir City.

As a convicted, registered sex offender, Griffis has rules and knows he has 48 hours to report any changes, however, he never showed up within 48 hours to report he had moved.

Mr. Griffis is also required to pay \$150 in annual fees to the Lenoir City Police Department and has failed to do so.

Detective Sartin made the arrest Thursday at City Court.



and producer diversification opportunities. To date, TAEP has provided cost share funds for more than 21,000 projects.

TAEP was established in 2005 and supported by the General Assembly to increase farm income by helping farmers invest in better farming practices and by encouraging diversification and innovation. Through TAEP, farmers can qualify for 35 or 50 percent cost share, ranging from a maximum of \$1,200 to \$15,000 depending on the project.

Applications are available at most farm agencies including USDA Farm Service Agency, UT Extension and Farm Bureau offices, as well as most farm supply stores. To ensure accuracy, producers are encouraged to work with their local extension agent or local TDA representative when completing the application.
