



an open fire in the middle of your living room. Your family sleeps on the ground and eats what little you can grow or trade among others in similar situations. Your children can go to school from kindergarten to the fifth grade if you can afford a uniform for them and high school is for the elite and wealthy.

If you are lucky you can find a meaningless job earning up to a dollar a day but that is less common than just trying to sell some vegetables or coffee beans you grow on a hill so steep that goats don't even travel it. Getting the visual????

This is exactly where Angie and I are serving the Lord this

week and we are thankful to be here. I have looked into the eyes of children who live under these conditions yet they smile like crazy for a bowl of black beans, a tortilla and a glass of rice milk. These children would think that Loudon County Tennessee sat behind a set of pearly gates with streets made of gold. I am humbled by what I have seen yet thankful for the opportunity to be here.

am writing to you on Wednesday about half way through our mission trip to a small village called San Mateo just outside of Guatemala City, Guatemala. Our team has been conducting a feeding center for about fifty of the least privileged of these local kids and having a Vacation

Bible School to tell them how much Jesus loves them. Today the young girls were given a small doll made by members of our church and the young boys were given a harmonica donated by Mr. Carl McPeak, my brother in Christ. These children most likely have never been given gifts as nice as this, yet these items are equal to what we spend each day at the convenience store on our way to work.

Tomorrow we are building cook stoves for five families, chicken coupes for two families and delivering about fifteen food baskets all donated by you and members of our team. Thursday we are "serving soles" by washing the feet of these babies and giving them a new pair of shoes donated by your generosity.

I wish each of you could see this place. God has blessed us more than we can imagine. There are people here that smile when they really have nothing to smile about yet we can't drive to town without giving someone the evil eye for pulling out in front of our

SUV on the way to Walmart!

Internet service is very poor where I am staying so I haven't had much success, or time, to post my daily journal of this mission trip. By the first of the week I will try to post each day's journal entry describing the work our Lord and Savior is allowing us to do in His name. We have taken hundreds of photos and I'm excited to share them with all of you who so graciously gave shoes, socks and other items to assist these poor but loving villagers. I love each of you and I love serving Jesus, who first served me by giving His life for me and you on a hill called Calvary a little over two thousand years ago.

If you haven't heard yet, He is alive and well and He sits at the right hand of God Almighty preparing an eternal home for me, you and these fine people in the village of San Mateo. Thanks for reading and may God continue to bless you and your family.






Officer Lawson went over to the truck and made contact with Cynthia Kellum and

on scene and found he had slurred speech, red bloodshot eyes, and a strong odor of alcohol on his breath. He stated he'd consumed 4 margaritas.


Kelley became argumentative with law
