



cally those who speed in school zones and pass stopped school buses, as well as raise awareness on school safety in Tennessee. "The ultimate goal of the Tennessee Highway Patrol is to protect children from motorists who disregard the law, especially around the school zones," said Department of Safety and Homeland Security Commissioner Bill Gibbons. "However, we must educate motorists, parents and children on the importance of safe pedestrian movement and accident prevention in order to ensure traffic safety. We all have a responsibility to make sure children travel to and from school safely."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration

(NHTSA), from 2000 to 2009, 1,386 people died in school transportation-related crashes - an average of 139 fatalities per year. One hundred and thirty (130) schoolage pedestrians (younger than 19) have died in school transportation-related crashes during that same time period, and 56 (43 percent) schoolage pedestrians killed school transportation-related crashes were between five and seven years old. NHTSA states more school-age pedestrians are killed between the hours of 3 p.m. and 4 p.m. than any other time of day.

"We are urging motorists to exercise caution, be alert and to slow down in school zones and around school buses," said THP Colonel Tracy Trott. "Our state troopers will not hesitate to hand

out citations, but that is not our objective. This enforcement campaign was designed to encourage everyone to practice safe driving and pedestrian habits."

Drivers who are found distracted, impatient and careless can expect to face stiff penalties. The speed limit is 15 miles per hour in school zones and the fine for speeding in a school zone is up to \$500. It is also against the law to pass a school bus when it is stopped and loading or unloading passengers. The driver can be fined no less than \$250 and up to \$1,000.

In 2010, State Troopers issued 3,186 citations in school zones. That's down from 5,445 citations issued in 2009. Of the 2010 citations, 739 were speeding violations, while two citations were handed out for


passing a stopped school bus. Since 2006, there has been a 21.0 percent decrease in the number of crashes occurring in school zones between the hours of 6 a.m. and 9 a.m. and the hours of 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. There was also a 20.3 percent decline in the number of school bus-related crashes between those same hours.

Each day, 26 million children in the United States ride school buses, including 600,000 Tennessee, according to NHTSA.NHTSA reports approximately 21 students were killed while they were entering or exiting a bus in the U.S. last year. Close to 800 children are killed annually and many more injured going to and from school in a vehicle other than a school bus, according to the NSC.

nursing homes and dialysis centers. When it occurs in these settings, it's known as health care-associated MRSA (HA-MRSA). HA-MRSA infections typically are associated with invasive procedures or devices, such as surgeries, intravenous tubing or artificial

joints.

Another type of MRSA infection has occurred in the wider community — among healthy people. This form, community-associated MRSA (CA-MRSA), often begins as a painful skin boil. It's spread by skin-to-skin contact. At-risk populations include groups such as high school wrestlers, child care workers and people who live in crowded conditions.

Staph skin infections, including MRSA, generally start as small red bumps that resemble pimples, boils or spider bites. These can quickly turn into deep, painful abscesses that require surgical draining. Sometimes the bacteria remain confined to the skin. But they can also burrow deep into the body, causing potentially life-threatening infections in bones, joints, surgical wounds, the bloodstream, heart valves and lungs.

Keep an eye on minor skin problems - pimples, insect bites, cuts and scrapes — especially in children. If wounds become infected, see your

doctor.

There are different varieties of Staphylococcus aureus bacteria, commonly called "staph." Staph bacteria are normally found on the skin or in the nose of about one-third of the population. The bacteria

are generally harmless unless they enter the body through a cut or other wound, and even then they usually cause only minor skin problems in healthy people.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 1 percent of the population carries the type of staph bacteria known as

MRSA.

MRSA is the result of decades of often unnecessary antibiotic use. For years, antibiotics have been prescribed for colds, flu and other viral infections that don't respond to these drugs. Even when antibiotics are used appropriately, they contribute to the rise of drug-resistant bacteria because they don't destroy every germ they target. Bacteria live on an evolutionary fast track, so germs that survive treatment with one antibiotic soon learn to resist others.

Because hospital and community strains of MRSA generally occur in different settings, the risk factors for the two

strains differ.

Risk factors for HA-MRSA include: Being hospitalized. MRSA remains a concern in hospitals, where it can attack those most vulnerable — older adults and people with weakened immune systems; Having an invasive medical device. Medical tubing - such as intravenous lines or urinary catheters — can provide a pathway for MRSA to travel into your body; Residing in a long term care facility. MRSA is prevalent in nursing homes. Carriers of MRSA have the ability to spread it, even if they're not sick themselves.

Risk factors for CA-MRSA include: Participating in con-

tact sports. MRSA can spread easily through cuts and abrasions and skin-to-skin contact; Living in crowded or unsanitary conditions. Outbreaks of MRSA have occurred in military training camps, child care centers and jails; Men having sex with men. Homosexual men have a higher risk of developing MRSA infections.

MRSA infections can resist the effects of many common antibiotics, so they are more difficult to treat. This can allow the infections to spread and sometimes become life-

threatening.

MRSA infections may affect your bloodstream, lungs,

heart, bones or joints.

Doctors diagnose MRSA by checking a tissue sample or nasal secretions for signs of drug-resistant bacteria. The sample is sent to a lab where it's placed in a dish of nutrients that encourage bacterial growth. But because it takes about 48 hours for the bacteria to grow, newer tests that can detect staph DNA in a matter of hours are now becoming more widely available.

Both community- and health care-associated strains of MRSA still respond to certain antibiotics. In some cases, antibiotics may not be necessary. For example, doctors may drain a superficial abscess caused by MRSA rather than treat the infection with

drugs.

In the hospital, people who are infected or colonized with MRSA often are placed in isolation as a precaution to prevent the spread of MRSA. Visitors and health care workers caring for people in isolation may be required to wear protective garments and must follow strict hand hygiene procedures. Contaminated surfaces and laundry items should be properly disinfected.

Tips for preventing CA-MRSA include: Washing your hands. Careful hand washing remains your best defense against germs. Scrub hands briskly for at least 15 seconds, then dry them with a disposable towel and use another towel to turn off the faucet. Carry a small bottle of hand sanitizer containing at least 60 percent alcohol for times when you don't have access to soap and water; Keep wounds covered. Keep cuts and abrasions clean and covered with sterile. dry bandages until they heal. The pus from infected sores may contain MRSA, and keeping wounds covered will help keep the bacteria from spreading; Keep personal items personal. Avoid sharing personal items such as towels, sheets, razors, clothing and athletic equipment. MRSA spreads on contaminated objects as well as through direct contact; Shower after athletic games or practices. Shower immediately after each game or practice. Use soap and water. Don't share towels; Sanitize linens. If you have a cut or sore, wash towels and bed linens in a washing machine set to the hottest water setting (with added bleach, if possible) and dry them in a hot dryer. 




