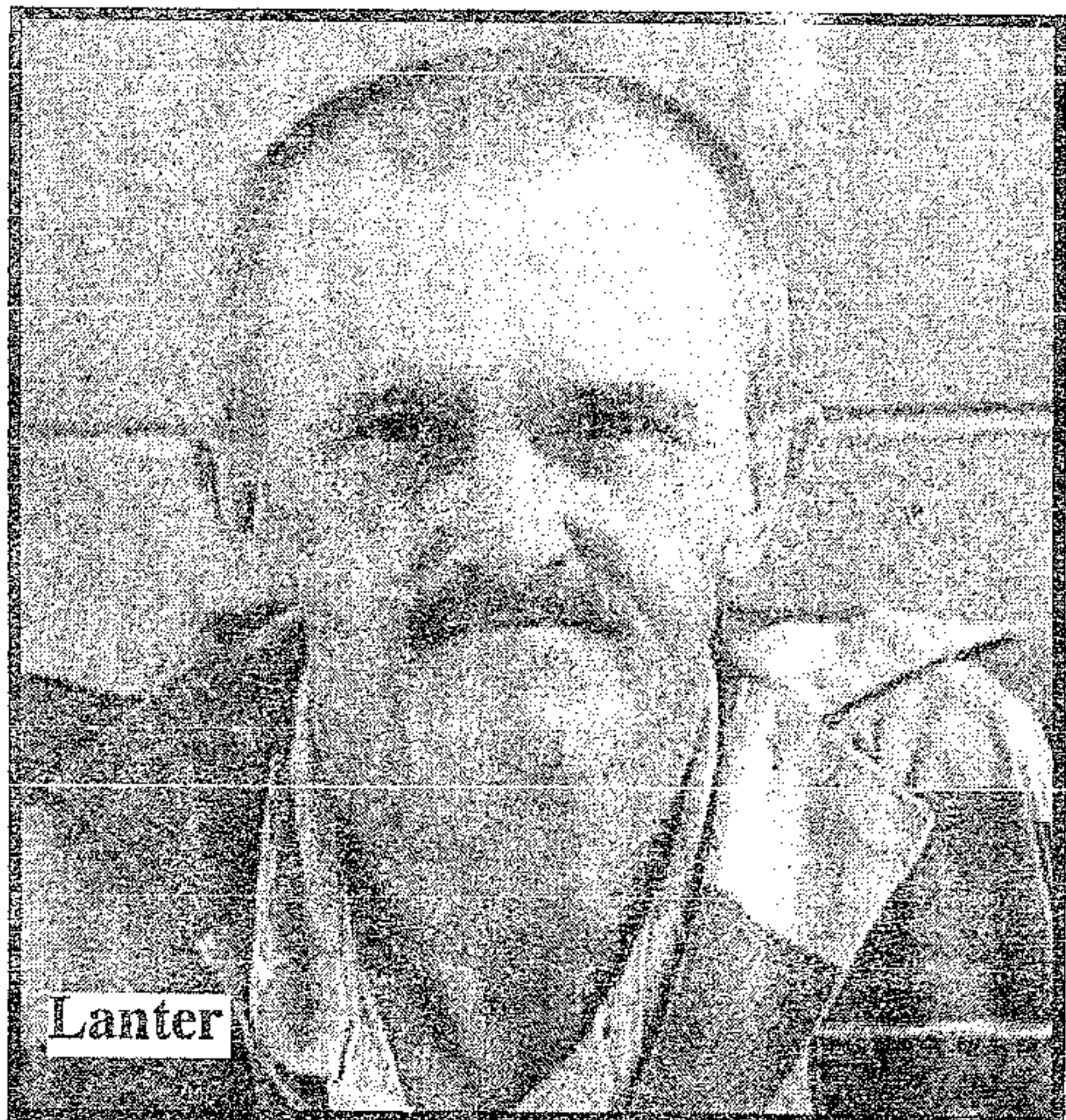

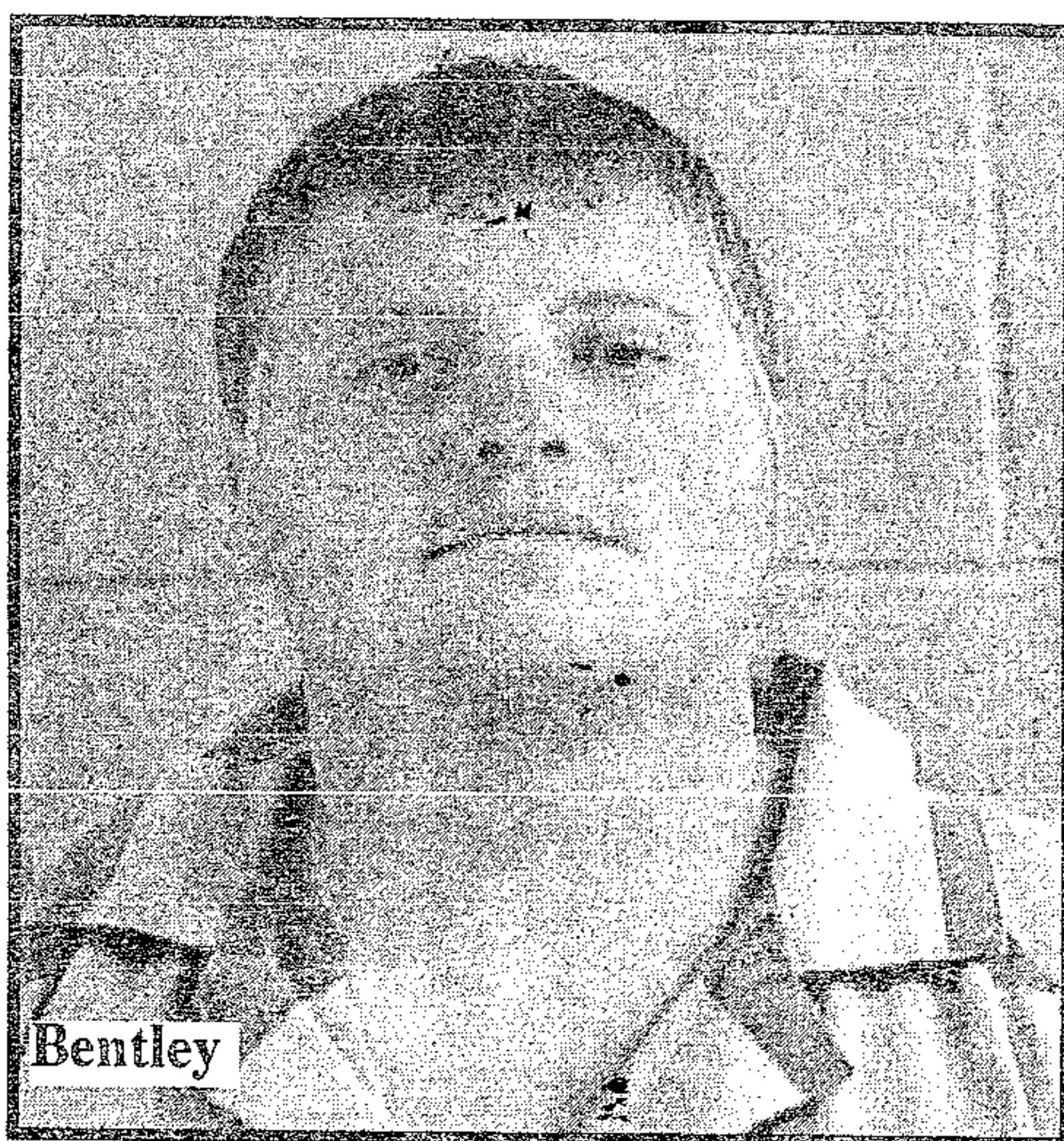

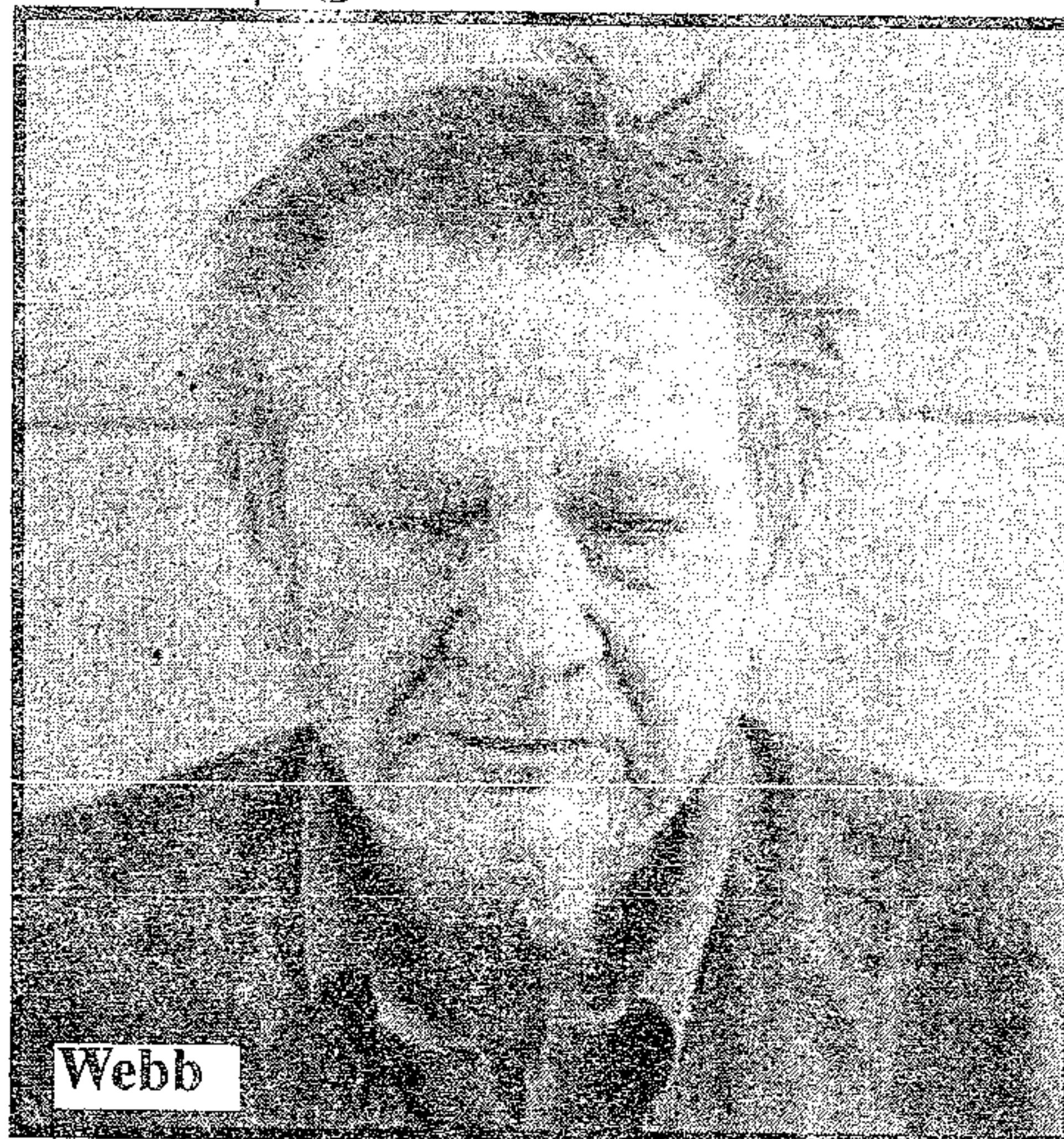

Deputy Bobby Hamilton, LCSO responded to Hwy 11 on a domestic assault.

According to the warrants, when the deputy arrived he talked with a victim who reported a week ago he had to fire Joshua D. Bentley from the family business.

On October 6, 2012 Bentley came to the business and threw a coke into one of the victim's face.

Bentley then punched victim one in the face knocking him down and then got on top and began to punch victim one in the face.

An employee then began to get Bentley off victim one. The victim's wife tried to help the employee and Bentley choked and knocked her down.

The victim's mother then tried to get Bentley off the victim and he hurt her left arm.

Joshua Bentley finally was pulled off the victim and still was cursing him and the man told Joshua to leave, but he would not.

Joshua Bentley screamed and cursed at victim one for a few more minutes and then finally left.

Victim one did have a cut on the right side of his forehead and pump knot, and a cut on his left elbow along with a swollen eye.

The man and his wife did seek medical treatment for their injuries.

The wife of the victim had a scraped right knee and red marks on her throat.

The mother had a cut on her left elbow.

According to the report, Trooper Eric Miller, THP noticed Rebecca Pelfrey not wearing a seatbelt and

Later Harmon stated he had borrowed his grandmothers car to be the non impaired driver and take his fiancée to the methadone clinic. Upon returning he began to crush and snort hydrocodone 10mg tablets. Harmon began not to feel well and they stopped in Charleston to switch drivers.

Investigation Continues into Killing of Bald Eagle in West Tennessee

JACKSON, - The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency and the United State Fish and Wildlife Service are continuing to investigate the killing of a bald eagle in West Tennessee.

A mature bald eagle was shot on Oct. 29 in the area of Pine Top Road and Silerton Road (Highway 125) in Hardeman County near the Silerton community. The eagle has since died from the injuries sustained in the shooting.

The TWRA and the USFWS are asking anyone with information concerning this crime to telephone USFWS Special Agent Zach Green (901-380-3577) or TWRA

wildlife officers Bubba Spencer or Matt Canada (1-800-372-3928). Information may also be received on the TWRA Poaching Hotline (1-800-831-1173).

The person who provides information resulting in the successful prosecution of the persons or persons responsible for this crime will be eligible to receive a \$6,000 reward.

Bald eagles are protected by the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act and Migratory Bird Treaty act, both federal wildlife statues. Violations of these statues carry maximum criminal penalties of up to \$100,000 and/or one year in federal prison.


vants within the department and for the citizens of Tennessee."
