Season

numbers continue to be reported.

The 17,093 reported as of noon (CST) on Monday surpasses the 2011 total of 14,463 over the same time frame in 2011. Since the initial segment of archery season for deer began on Sept. 22, 84,825 deer have been harvested, an increase of 3,522 over the same period as last year.

On the opening weekend of gun season, Giles County was the overall top county harvest with 720 deer harvested. Rounding out the top

10 counties over the weekend were Henry County 662, Fayette County 622, Weakley County 566, Hardeman County 560, Maury County 538, Lincoln County 496, Carroll County 467, Madison County 420, and Lawrence County 373.

Tennessee sportsmen have one continuous gun season that will continue through Jan. 6, 2013. The continuous season replaced the previously two segmented hunting seasons that were in place prior to last year.

 LCSO ND, a small silver pill container with 19 small round blue pills identified as 30mg oxycodone were found

inside a safe located in the bedroom of James Allison.

James Allison does not have a prescription for the oxycodone found. Text messages

found on James Allison and Sarah Elizabeth Blosser's cell phones indicate and are consistent with the sale of narcotics and prescription pain medication.

A loaded .22 caliber Smith and Wesson M&P rifle and a Mossberg 12 gauge pump action shotgun were found next to the bed where James Allison and Sarah Blosser were sleeping at the time the search warrant was conducted. A glass marijuana pipe, grinder and rolling papers were found on a speaker next to the bed.

Two cut straws with a powder residue were found in the bedroom belonging to Kayla Michelle Allison. Kayla Allison advised the straws belonged to her.

Sarah Elizabeth Blosser, 22, of Phillips Road, Lenoir City was charged with possession of schedule II (oxycodone) for resale and possession of drug paraphernalia.

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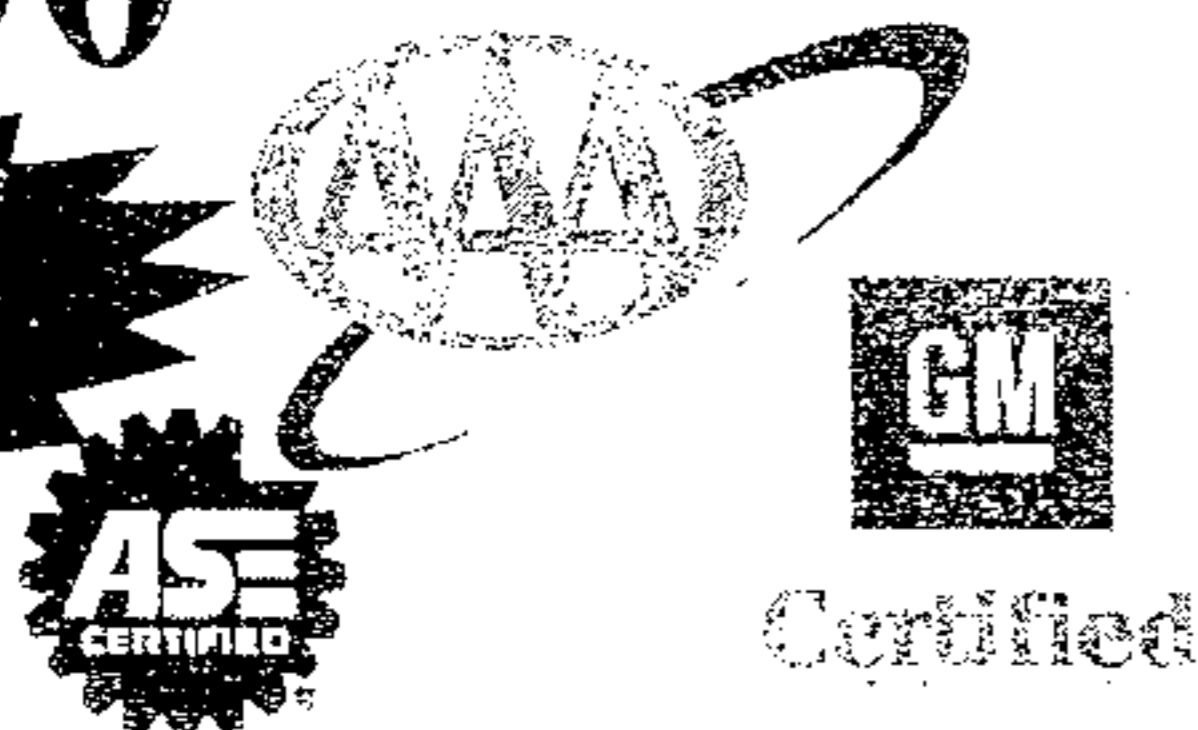
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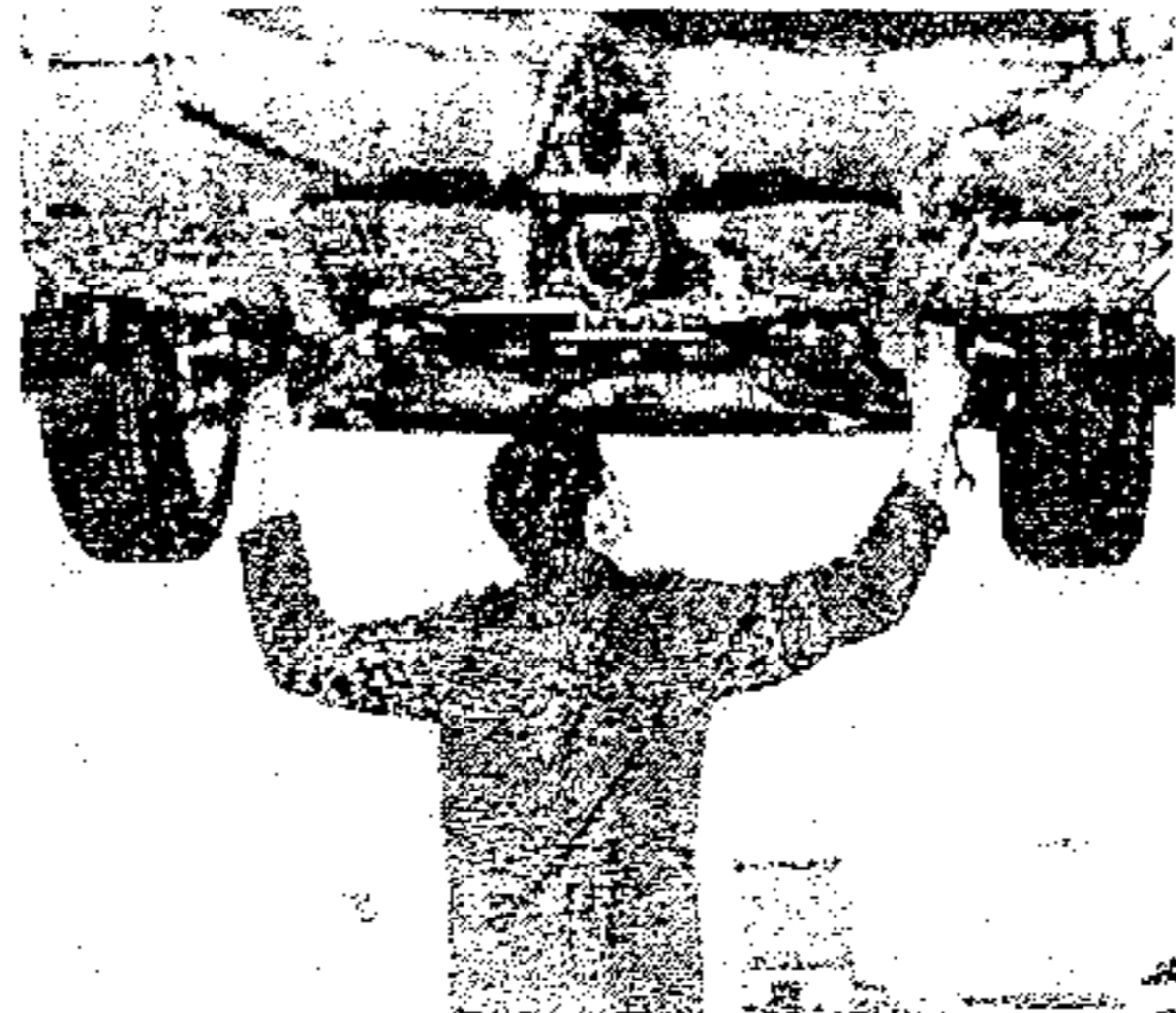

Rate

October decreased to 8.2 percent, down from the September revised rate of 8.3 percent. The national unemploy-

ment rate for October 2012 was 7.9 percent, 0.1 percentage point higher than the September rate.

Economic Summary:

•Tennessee's October unemployment rate is the lowest rate since June.

•Over the past year, Tennessee's unemploy-

ment rate declined from 8.9% to 8.2% (-0.7 percentage point), while the national rate declined from 8.9% to 7.9% (-1.0 percentage point).

•Total nonfarm employment increased 7,500 jobs from September to October, with increases in leisure/hospitality and professional/business services. There were declines in government and mining/logging/construction.

•Over the year, non-farm jobs increased 24,800, with increases in manufacturing and education/health services. There were declines in wholesale trade and financial activities.

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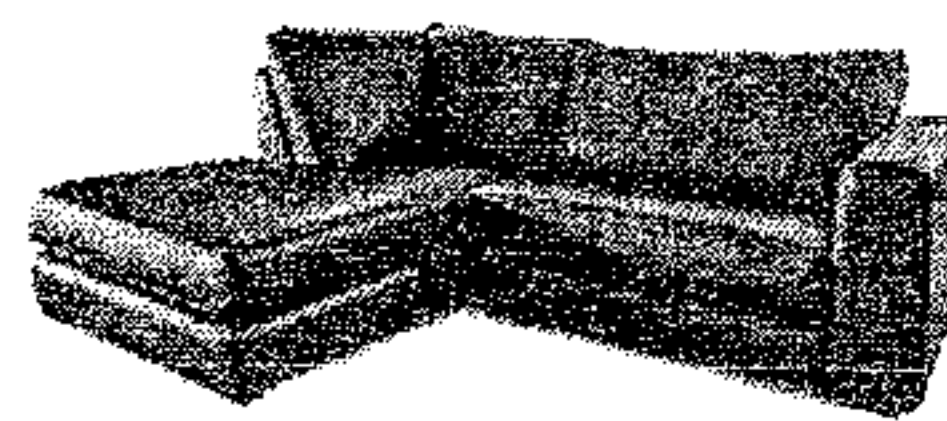


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Holiday

enforcement will begin at 6 p.m. Wednesday, November 21 and end at midnight Sunday, November 25.

The "No Refusal" law allows law enforcement officials to seek search warrants for blood samples in cases involving suspected impaired drivers. The goal is to deter impaired driving and reduce fatal crashes on Tennessee roadways. The Thanksgiving Holiday marks the third "No Refusal" enforcement ef-

fort following campaigns over the Fourth of July and Labor Day holiday periods.

"Thanksgiving is the beginning of the holiday travel season for millions of Americans. In Tennessee, State Troopers, prosecutors and judges in 16 counties across the state have joined together to ensure drunk drivers are removed from the roadways and travelers get to their destination safely. We thank both the local and state officials in advance for their participation in this effort," Com-

missioner Gibbons said.

This targeted "No Refusal" enforcement will focus on 16 counties where impaired driving and fatal crashes have increased in 2012. Two counties from each of the eight THP Districts will participate, including Monroe and Sevier (Knoxville District); Franklin and Grundy (Chattanooga District); Davidson and Sumner (Nashville District); Shelby and Fayette (Memphis District); Cocke and Washington (Fall Branch District); Clay

and Putnam (Cookeville District); Lawrence and Maury (Lawrenceburg District); and Chester and Weakley (Jackson District).

Nine people lost their lives on Tennessee roadways during last year's Thanksgiving Day Holiday period. That is a decrease of 43.8 percent over the total from 2010 (16). One of the seven vehicle occupants killed during the 2011 Thanksgiving Holiday weekend was not wearing safety restraints. Almost half (44.4) percent of those killed were alcohol-related deaths.

AAA predicts 43.6 million Americans will travel at least 50 miles from home over the holiday, up just 0.7 percent from last year. That compares with an increase of eight and six percent, respectively, in the last two years.

"We anticipate an increase in traffic through Tennessee during the holidays," Colonel Trott said. "State Troopers will saturate the interstate systems and high-crash corridors and place an emphasis on impaired driving, seat belt usage and traffic law compliance. Our goal is to save lives."

Although safety belt usage was measured at 83.7 percent in 2012, more than 56 percent of

passenger vehicle occupants killed in Tennessee traffic crashes were not wearing a safety belt in 2011 (among known seatbelt usage).

In Tennessee, 53.5 percent of vehicular fatalities are from unrestrained vehicle occupants in 2012. Additionally, alcohol related crashes are on the rise in Tennessee. There have been over 5,000 alcohol crashes already this year. That's an increase of 95 more impaired driving crashes (1.9%) than this time last year.

"Our statewide goal is to reduce the number of serious injury and fatal motor vehicle crashes throughout Tennessee," Governor's Highway Safety Office Director Kendell Poole said. "We've significantly increased our efforts by partnering with local law enforcement agencies, as well as state officials during enforcement campaigns such as 'No Refusal.' Everyone's participation is crucial for the success of this campaign."

As of November 19, preliminary statistics indicate that 890 people have died on Tennessee roadways in 2012, an increase of 50 deaths compared to 840 fatalities at this same time a year ago.

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
