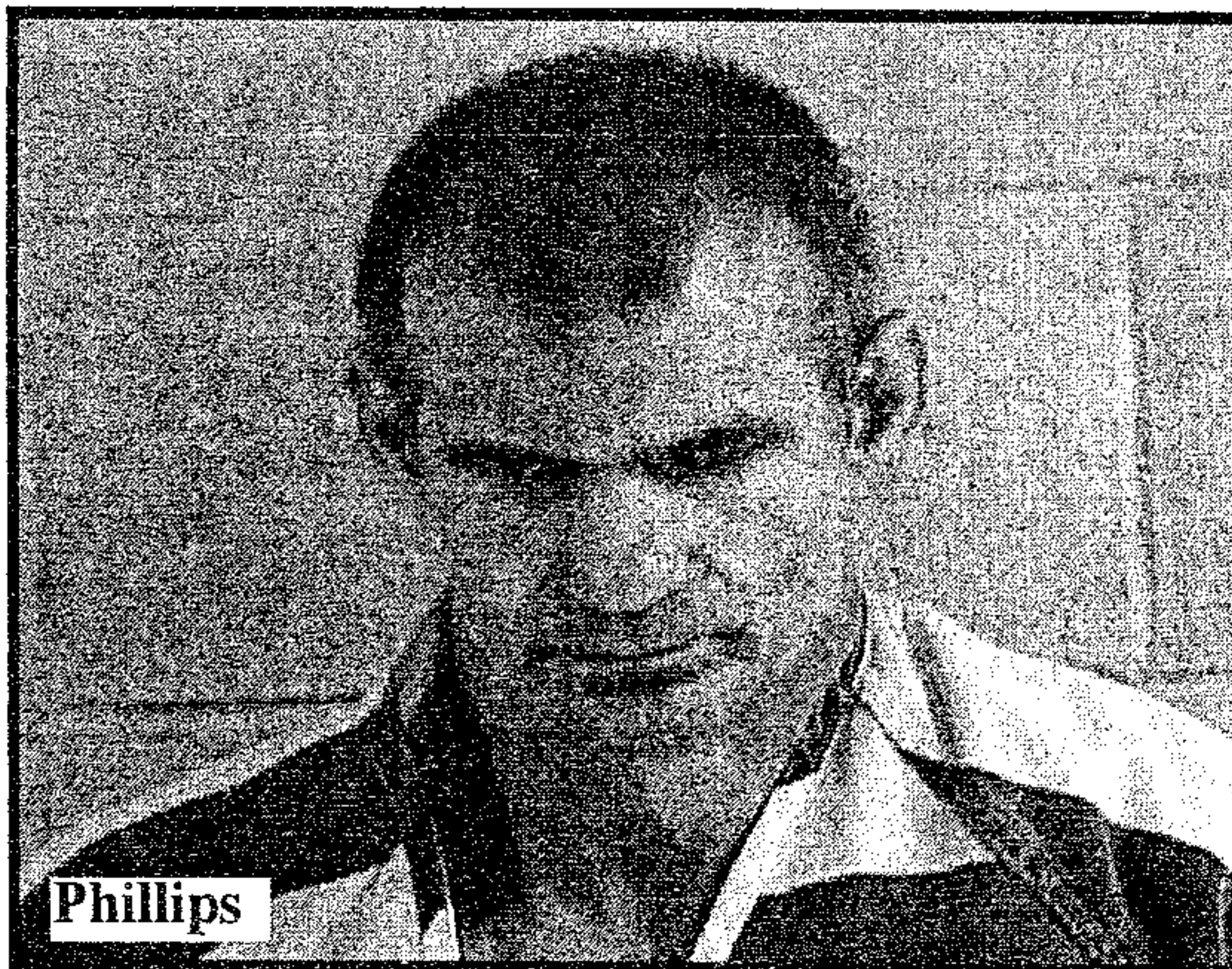
Hall nabs repeat thief

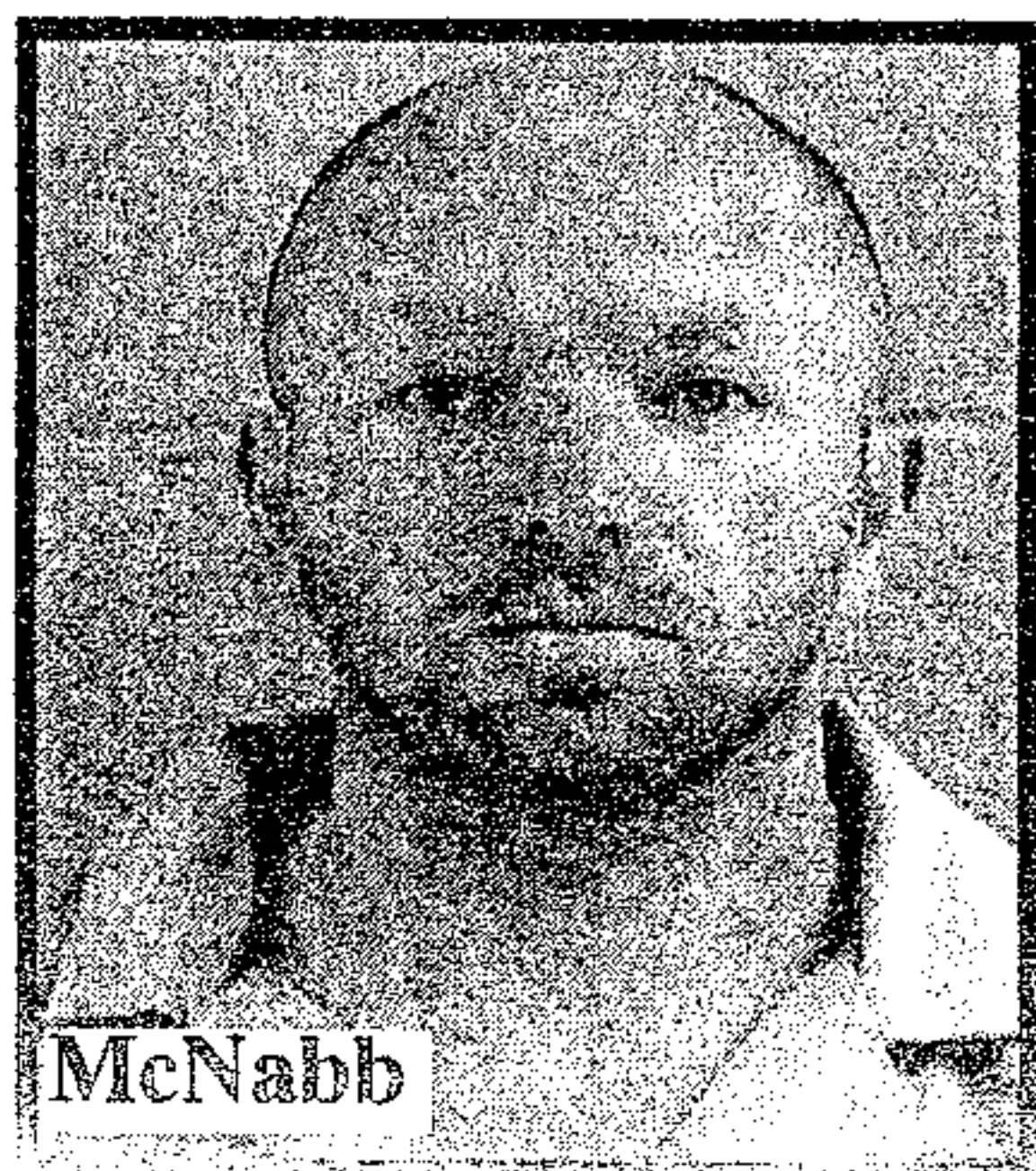

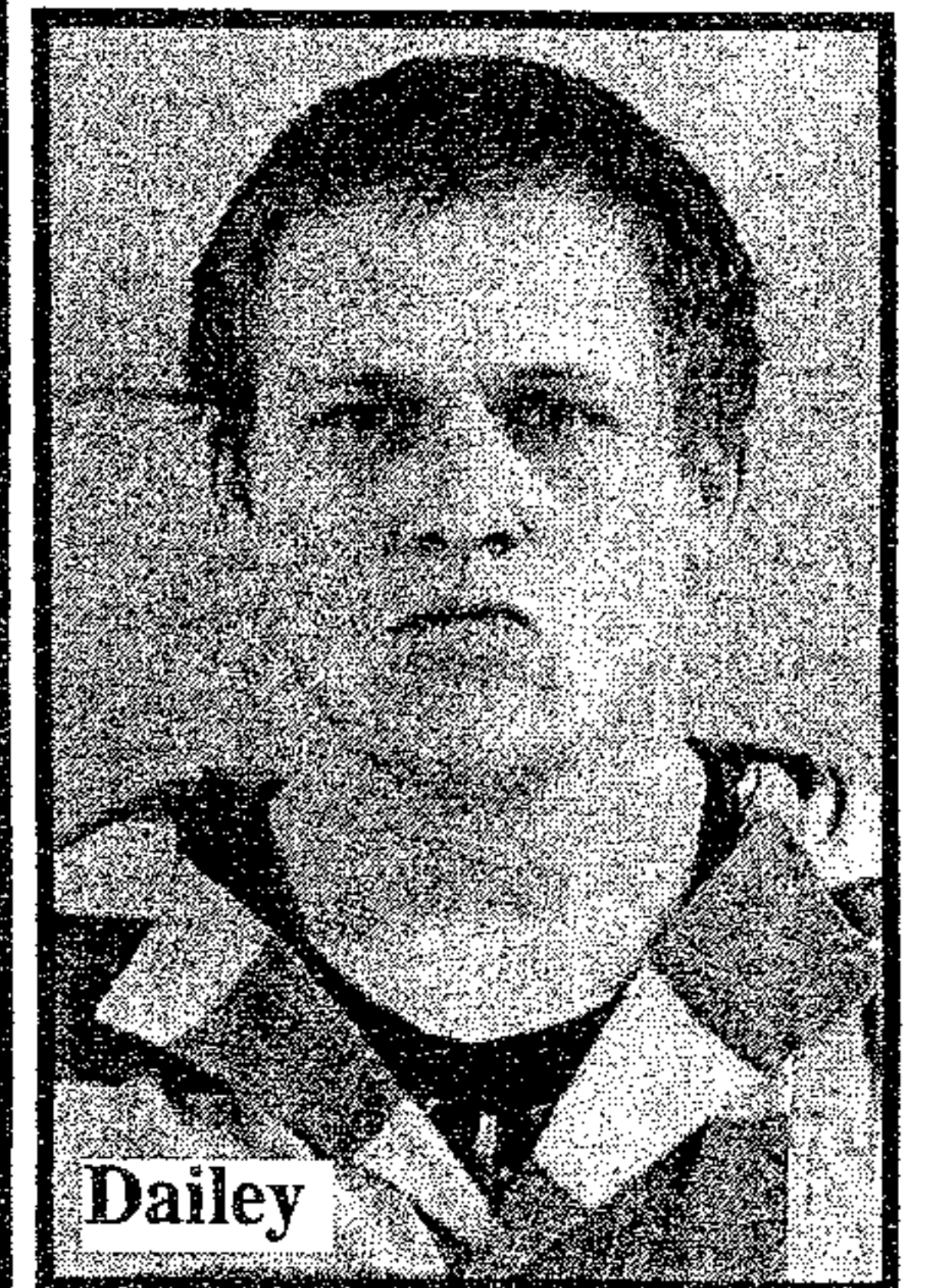


I am excited to begin today's Good News by sharing yet another example of how Jesus provides for those who trust Him.

Counterfeiters

According to warrants filed by Detective Jeff Russell LCSO CID; on July 30, 2012 an employee of Cash Express reported she and another person repossessed a Geo Tracker from Kelly Adams and Chris Smallen, who were staying at Creekswood Apartments in Loudon. When the employee was looking for a switch to open the hood, she

opened the glove box and in the glove box in plain view were several copies of different currency.

The employee then locked the vehicle and contacted law enforcement.

When Detective Russell arrived he saw several papers in the open glove box that contained copied currency. Given it was in plain view, and permission was granted by Cash Advance, the investigator seized the property.

With further investigation, the detective found six \$20 bills with the same serial number, ten \$10 bills with the same serial number, and ten \$5 bills with the same serial number. All these bills were counterfeit.

Kelly Suzanne Ad-

ams, 31, and Christopher Lee Smallen, 33, of Union Street, Loudon were charged with four counts of criminal simulation.

Deputy Aaron Carroll and Deputy Bruce Padgett, LCSO made the arrests.

Adams and Smallen were each charged with three counts of criminal simulation in late June when investigators reported finding a printer and more than \$800 in counterfeit money inside their residence during an investigation of counterfeiting paper money in Lenoir City. Fortunately for us, the weather forecast was not the same as God's plan. The rain held off until the moment the sale was over and all outdoor items were packed up and in the dry. What a blessing!

By 1 P.M. We had raised the remainder of the \$2,500 for the church property project, raised \$500 extra dollars to help Pastor Hales with an upcoming mission trip to Asia, donated the remaining items to a family who could use them and still had over two hundred dollars left in our class budget for the next need that God lays on our hearts. **THIS IS THE POWER OF GOD THAT I SPEAK OF EACH WEEK!** Thank you Lord for being so faithful and thanks to all who came, bought and gave! God was watching.

This project began several months ago when God laid a burden for Big Sky Fellowship on the heart of a local Christian preacher from Loudon named Tom

McCurry. Tom felt led to ask each of the forty baptist churches in the Loudon County Baptist Association to raise \$2,500 each by the end of 2012 to help Big Sky purchase this land for a church. Tom, as Blondie and I have, has seen the need for the gospel to be proclaimed in Montana and you, The Good News readers, have heard us talk about what God is doing out there more than once. Tom McCurry's family and church (Stockton Valley Baptist) helped build and paint forty small wooden churches to be used as a "Piggy Bank" of sorts within each of the forty churches in our association. We have learned that a life trusted to God is a life worth living and the little things just don't matter anymore. We have more fun serving the Lord and living for Him than could ever be possible without Him. It is truly amazing!

Blondie and I also believe it is important to remind you that we do not receive any money for submitting this
