

Loudon County Sheriff Tim Guider announces the arrest of Mr. Patton Jerry Woore, 65, of 337 Lee Hi Street, Lenoir City on charges ranging from Drugs to Exploitation of a Minor. Beginning several months ago, the Narcotics Investigators and Criminal Investigators received information that Moore may be involved in distribution of narcotics and possibly be having sex with underage females. Upon further investigation the Narcotics Division conducted several hours of surveillance and obtained a search warrant for the Moore residence. Both narcotics and criminal investigators searched the residence and Mr. Moore was taken into custody for possession of Schedule II narcotics and also criminal conspiracy, which is a felony. Patton Jerry Moore, 65, Lee Hi Street, was charged with possession of schedule II oxycodone for resale, conspiracy to sell and deliver schedule II, possession of a weapon during the commission of a felony and maintaining a dwelling where drugs are used or sold. Investigator Shane Ezell, LCSO ND made the arrest.

In two separate incidents at Moore's residence, two people apparently showed up for a pill buy at the wrong time and were charged.

According to warrants; on August 24, 2012, while LCSO ND and CID were executing a search warrant at Lee Hi Street at the residence of Patton Jerry Moore, Sandra Kay Bennett was searched at the residence and a 2mg Alprazolam and a round brown pill identified as Oxycontin were found in her purse. 

While the operation was underway at the residence, Jill Denise Varner came to the door of the residence. Varner was holding \$50 in her right hand and during a mirandized interview, Varner admitted she had came to the residence to purchase two Oxycodone pills.

aka Jill Green, 47, of Kelly Lane, Lenoir City was charged with conspiracy to posssess schedule II oxycodone.

According to the report, the 9th Judicial Drug Task Force conducted a search warrant, with the assistance of the Loudon Police Department, at the Steekee Street residence Jennifer Cordell. Cordell was present at the time of the search warrant and was found to be in possession of several Xanax pills and a large amount of US currency.

Cordell reportedly admitted to having sold approximately 50 oxycodone pills that she obtained from an unnamed source. These pills were sold for an

average of \$30 each and all pills were sold in the 24 hours prior to the execution of the search warrant.

During the search agents also located drug paraphernalia, which included hose clamps and several rolled up dollar bills.

The investigation was a joint effort between LPD and 9th DTF to attempt to slow the sale of prescription medication in the Loudon County area.

Jennifer Lynn Cordell, 31, of Steekee Street, Loudon was charged with sale and delivery of schedule II oxycodone, possession of schedule IV xanax, possession of drug paraphernalia and VOP. Agent Brendan DeBoer, 9th DTF made the arrest.

Tennessee's 2012 sea-

son will again be divided into three segments: Sept. I through Sept. 26; Oct. 13 through Oct. 28; and Dec. 19 through Jan. 15. Hunting times, other than opening day, are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset for all other days.

Doves found are throughout the various regions in the state, but the highest concentration is in farming areas. The hunter must have in his/her possession a valid state hunting license and Tennessee Migratory Bird Permit at all times while hunting. Hunters must have landowner's permission to hunt on private land.

The daily bag limit is 15. There is no limit on collared dove. Doves not readily identifiable as collared doves will be considered mourning doves and will count toward the mourning dove daily bag limit. No person shall take migratory

game birds by the aid of baiting, or on or over any baited area. Any auto-loading or repeating shotgun must be incapable of holding more than three shells while dove hunting.

More information on Tennessee's dove season can be found on the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency website (www.tnwildlife.org) under the "For Hunters" section. The 2012 Tennessee Hunting & Trapping Guide can also be viewed on the website or a copy may be obtained at any TWRA regional office or wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold.






