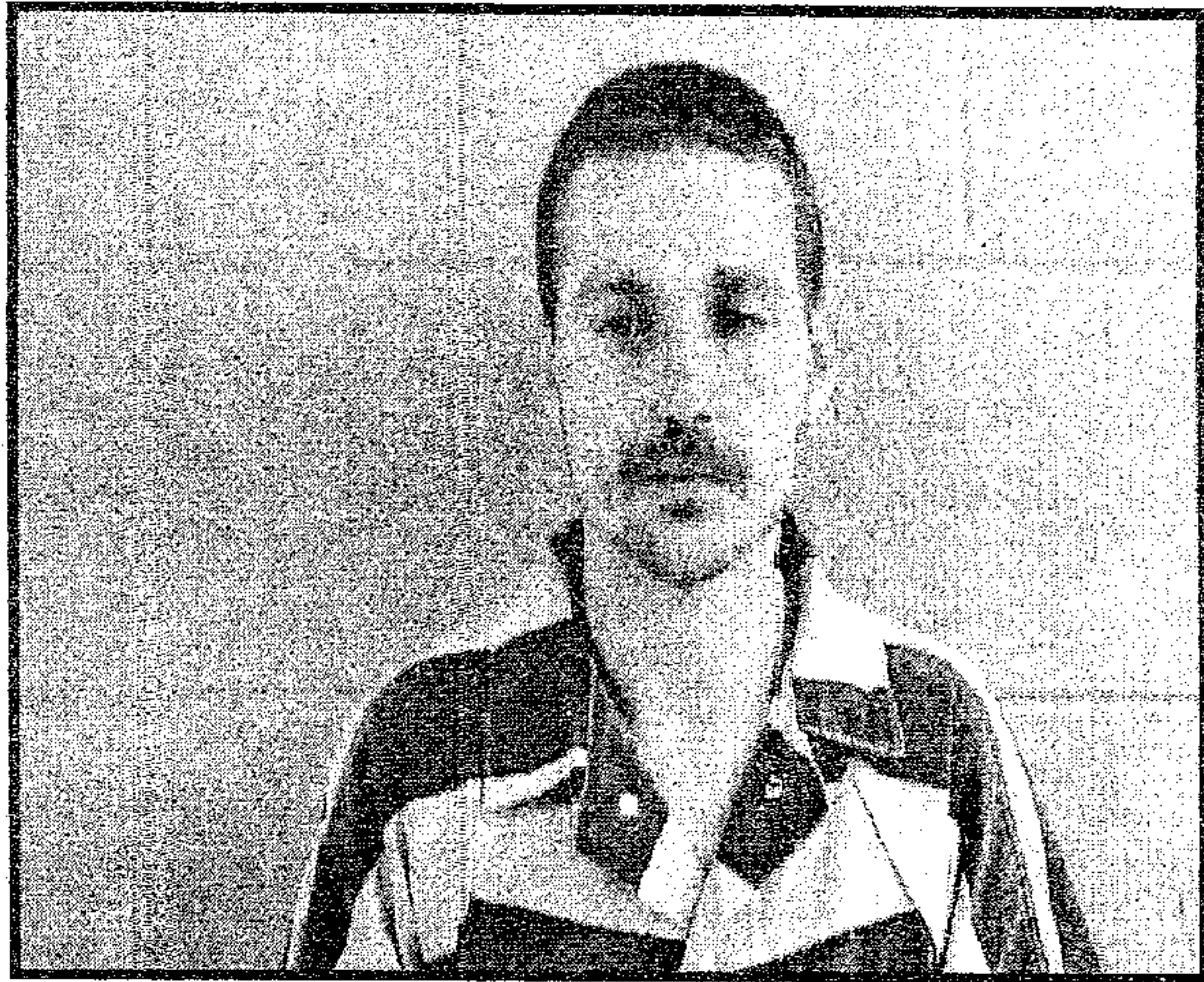

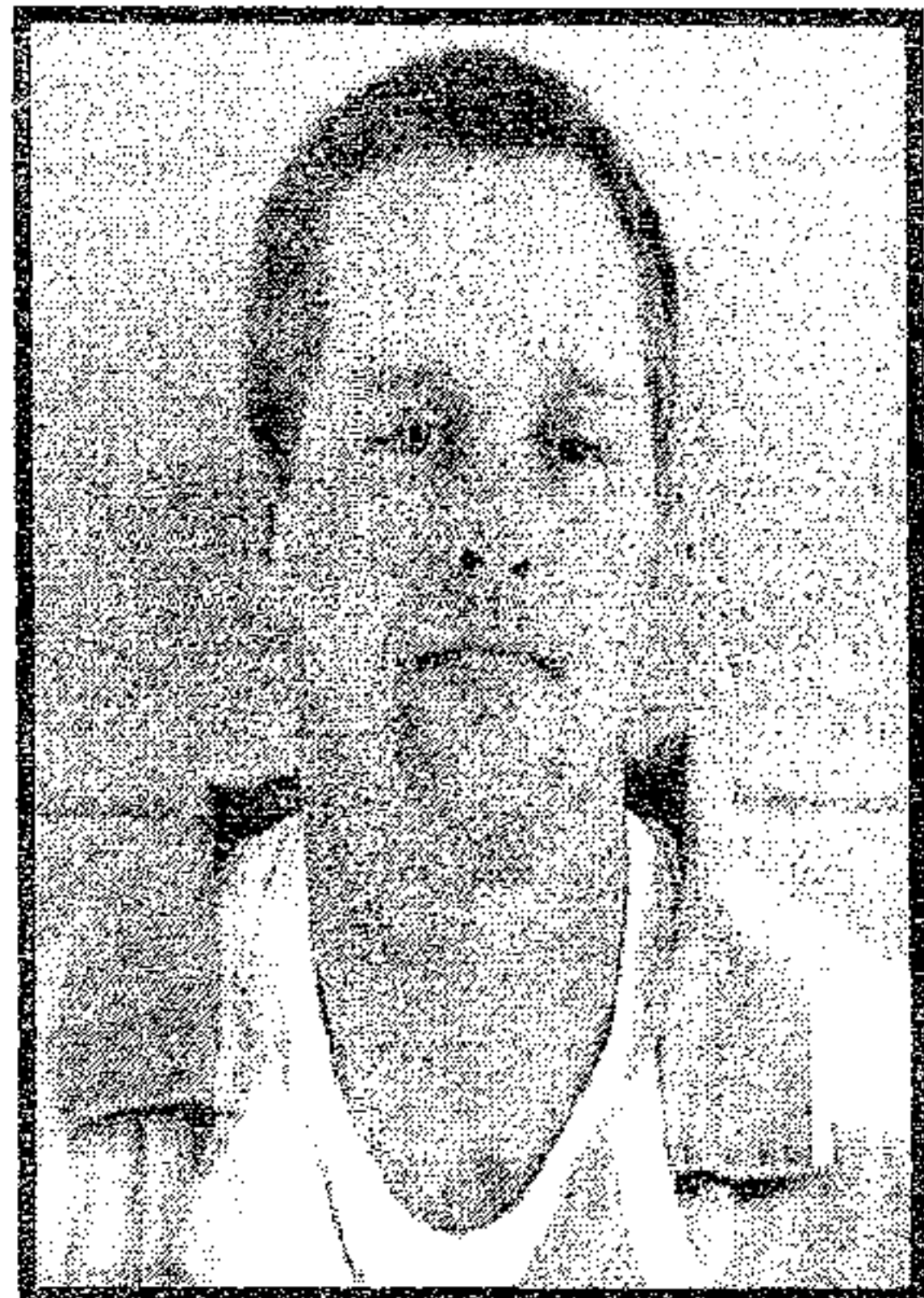

Whatever it Takes

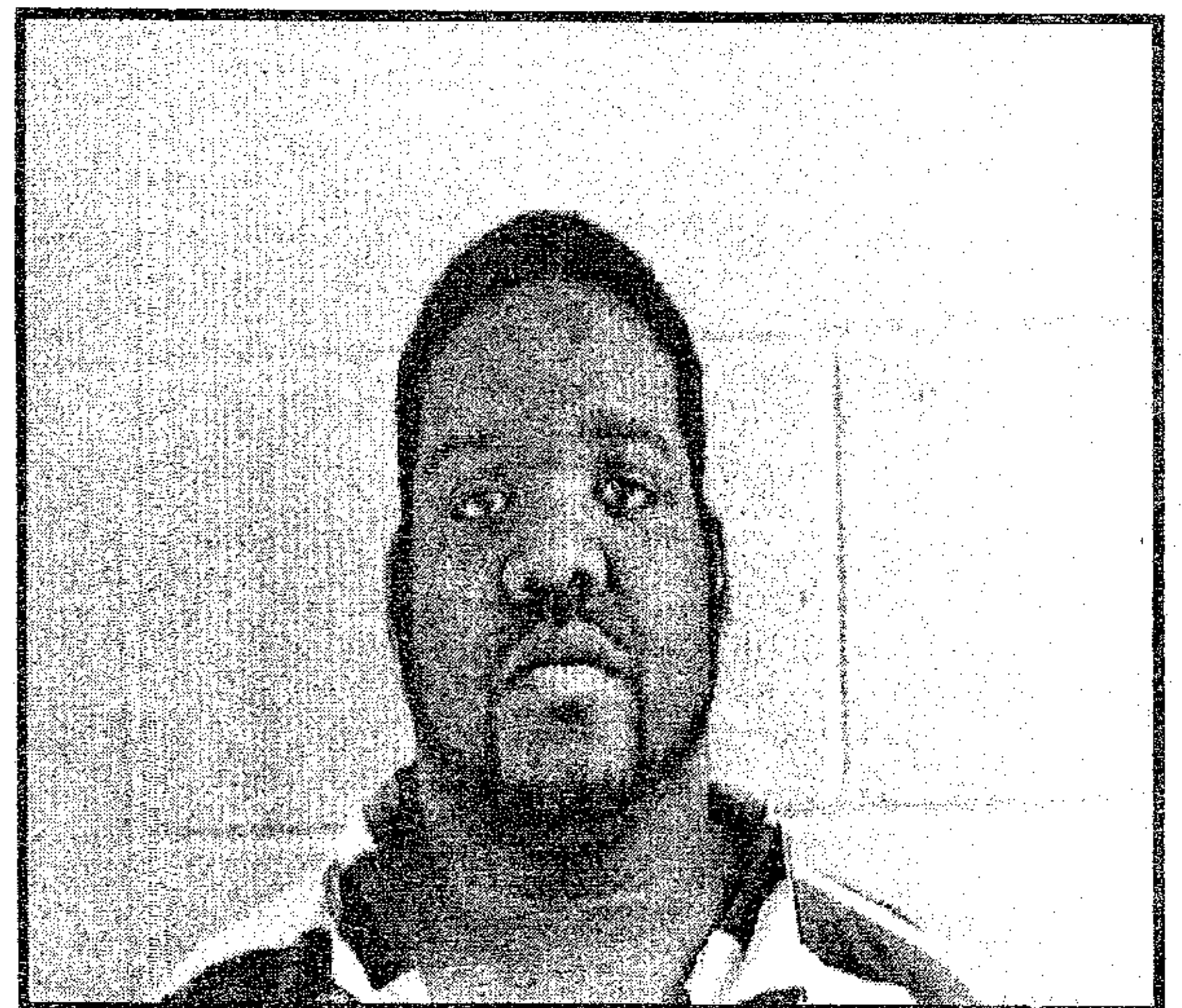

Mark (Caldwell) and I had a few months ago concerning this same topic. Preacher Mark explained to me that he is not a big golfer, but is willing to talk about golf, play golf or even become a golfer if it allows him the opportunity to share Jesus with someone who loves to golf.

I consider Preacher Mark a mentor so I listened intently during our conversation to obtain his council concerning the topic of making disciples. His advice was drawn upon experience, but also based upon the word of God that was once again revealed to me in my study time today. Consider the following scripture for yourself;

I Corinthians 9:19-23 (NKJV) (19) For though I am free from all men, I have made myself a servant of all, that I might win the more; (20) and to the Jews I became as a Jew, that I might win Jews; to those who are under the law, as under the law, that I might win those who are under the law; (21) to those who are without law, as without law (not being without law toward God, but under law toward Christ), that I might win those who are without law; (22) to the weak I became as weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all men that I might by all means save some. (23) Now this I do for the gospel's sake, that I may be partaker of it with you.

The Apostle Paul is

giving the church at Corinth the same advice that Preacher Mark drew upon to share with me even before Angie and I surrendered ourselves to serve here in Montana. It will be easy for me to become a fisherman in order to witness to those who love to fish; it will be easy for me to become an elk hunter so I can be qualified to share my faith with elk hunters; what I must remember is that I may have to become a homeless person (for a time) to gain the opportunity to share with the homeless or I may have to become a college student at a catholic college to be able to share with other college students.

I, we as Christians, sometimes will be called to leave our area of comfort in order to reach the lost. We may have to sacrifice some of our time, some of our talents and even some of our treasures in order to make the

gospel of Jesus known to the nations. Are you willing?

Today's message was as much for me as it is for you. I pray that I am always faithful in seeking and sharing with the lost. I pray that I am willing to do whatever it takes to proclaim the name of Jesus to those God places in my path.

Paul went on to state in verse 27 that he must discipline his body, bring it into subjection, lest, when he has preached to others he should find himself disqualified. We as Christians must also guard and protect our integrity as children of God so that our credibility as a witness is not tarnished or diminished.

Before leaving law enforcement, I had friends that I hoped to win to Christ but have not yet done so. There were times when other professing Christians would do or say un-

christian like things in front of my lost friend and I found myself so discouraged and frustrated with them. I wanted my lost friend to see Christians as different, as people engaged in the eternal impact of their every action. However, I could not judge them. In fact, I was just like them for many years. I could only pray that God would make them want to be more like Himself and that my lost friend would see Christ in my life and the lives of other Christians.

What if every Christian took their relationship with Christ and their responsibilities as Christ followers seriously? Could we not make an impact

that would change our families, change our communities and even the world? What if we were really "all things to all people" as the Apostle Paul described himself? What if we did whatever it took to see our lost friends come to Christ? What are you doing? Are you willing to do whatever it takes?

The eternal destination of many lost people is hanging in the balance, I pray that you and I both will do better today than yesterday, and even more so tomorrow! Thanks for reading. The two point conversion was not successful at this time. The Greenback defensive line held the Lenoir City Offensive line yet again to leave the score at half time Greenback 6 Lenoir City 0.

The whole third quarter of the game, the Cherokee's offense had the ball, At the top of the fourth quarter, Greenback's

The first touchdown that came from Greenback came early in the third quarter as Greenback Dylan Caldwell received a kick off return and ran it for a 65 yard Cherokee touchdown. The two point conversion no good at this time. The second touchdown came with :31 seconds left in the game, Greenback's Breeden Gilbert punches it in for a 14 yard Cherokee touchdown, leaving the game Greenback 12 Loudon 42.

with 7 tackles, Matthew Gilmore and Tim Russell both recorded 6 tackles each.
