stating his girlfriend, Vanessa Hicks son Tyler Hicks was threatening him and acting irrational. Upon arrival, the deputy met with Ms. Hicks and Mr. Harris who stated that Tyler Hicks was over by the vehicle and he was acting strange. Ms. Hicks was sitting on the ground crying. Deputy James Farr stayed with Ms. Hicks and Mr. Harris while Deputy Hutchens approached Mr. Hicks. Mr. Hicks was ex-

tremely fidgety and threw his hands up without being ordered to do so.

Upon contact all three subject appeared severely intoxicated. and grow as a Christian I have become convinced that our Bibles contain more valuable advice than I can even fathom. The Bible contains advice on marriage, finances, friendships, dependency, sin, attitude, disappointment, faith, spiritual growth, death, eternity and so many other topics that we face in our daily lives. While much of the Old Testament allows us to learn from the successes and failures of those who lived before us, it also gives us a glimpse into the character and glory of our Creator and how He desires and pursues our affection.

The New Testament allows us to see the ful-

fillment of the promise of Jesus described in the Old Testament, but then goes on to reveal who Christ really is, the sacrifice He made for us and the beginnings of the first century Christian church. We can learn for ourselves what Jesus taught His disciples, we can see how Jesus tells us to live and also obtain advice from the men whom Jesus specifically chose to carry the gospel to all people, eventually including us.

I have several "Go to" Books of the Bible that encourage me and guide my daily decision making, but one Book that is particularly rich with advice for Christian growth and understanding was written by James, the brother

of Jesus. As I was reading from a couple of chapters in the Book of James tonight, I felt compelled to begin a short series of articles that cruise through this book and share some of the useful advice that James felt was important for every Christian to know. The Book of James is only five chapters long so I figured we could unpack some of each chapter over the next..... Well we'll see how many weeks. My prayer is that you may find some (or all) of the advice given between the pages to be helpful in your daily lives and that you may see the usefulness of spending time with God through the study of His power-

ful, life changing Word.

The Book of James is actually a letter written by James, to the twelve tribes of Israel that are "Scattered abroad" (v1) and said to possibly be the oldest Book in the New Testament. As the persecution of young Jewish Christians increased throughout Judea and Samaria, Christians would relocate to other parts of the country and new churches would be formed, essentially beginning Jesus commandment to "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations" (Mathew 28:18). I believe this task is still incomplete and thus the driving force of mine and Blondie's heart for missions, but that's a

story for another day.

James 1:2-8 (NKJV) (2) My brethren, count it all joy when you fall into various trials, (3) knowing that the testing of your faith produces patience. (4) But let patience have its perfect work, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking nothing. (5) If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all liberally and without reproach, and it will be given to him. (6) But let him ask in faith, with no doubting, for he who doubts is like a wave of the sea driven and tossed by the wind. (7) For let not that man suppose that he will receive anything from the Lord; (8) he is a double-

minded man, unstable in all his ways.

James realized that Christians were not very popular in the first cen-

tury and that many were mocked, alienated and discriminated against. After Jesus' crucifixion and the stoning of Stephen, new believers in

Christ were faced with the very real threat of physical abuse and even death for confessing faith in Christ. James understood that living

a life for Jesus meant that tough times and the testing of one's faith was eminent and that many newly converted Jews could easily fall back into the traditions of the Jewish law and miss the opportunity to have a true relationship with the Savior.

James reminded the recipients (and us) that to have complete faith in Christ builds patience, and patience only builds more faith bringing them closer to God, Who is perfect. James was also reminding the reader that God will freely give wisdom and understanding to all that ask if their faith is genuine; but also there was no room to be straddling the fence with doubt. James described how doubting in the power of God would lead to instability and despair in numerous areas of their lives.

So, how does this scripture apply in today's society? Well, fortunately for us, we are not beaten, beheaded or burned at the stake for being Christians in America, but try sharing the gospel of Jesus in the market place while in China, Morocco, India, Iran or Indonesia and see how that works out for ya!

Christianity in our area, however, is con-

stantly under attack by secular groups and liberal lawyers who don't understand why we celebrate Christmas, or why we like to pray for our kids before they play football. Is it really because they don't understand or because we haven't shared the gospel with them?

The advice given by James to some of the first Jewish believers is just as valid today for you and me as it was to the scattered believers of that day. Many people who claim to be followers of Christ display no faith in God's ability to heal our nation from what God has told us is sin. We don't often see the power of God because we do not trust in the power of God and our patience is almost nonexistent. We doubt that we can change things so we sit back and watch Satan take more ground every day. The truth is that WE cannot change the way our world is headed.... but I know Someone who can!

Let the words of James, the brother of Jesus, speak to you today. Where is your faith focused? Where does your trust lie? How much room do you make for God in your life? If you're still breathing, then it's not too late to start!

“Max” Haston, Tennessee’s Adjutant General.

The Adjutant General, a constitutional officer of the state appointed by the Governor, is responsible for the leadership and command of the Tennessee Army and Air National Guard, the Tennessee Emergency

Management Agency and the Bureau of War Records.

Major General Haston discussed details of his Military Department which oversees a total budget, including state and federal funds of over \$400 million. He also provided members and guest with the current status of all the Tennessee Army and

Air National Guard units which stand at almost 17,000 officers and enlisted personnel. Haston is a native of McMinnville and currently resides in Knoxville.
