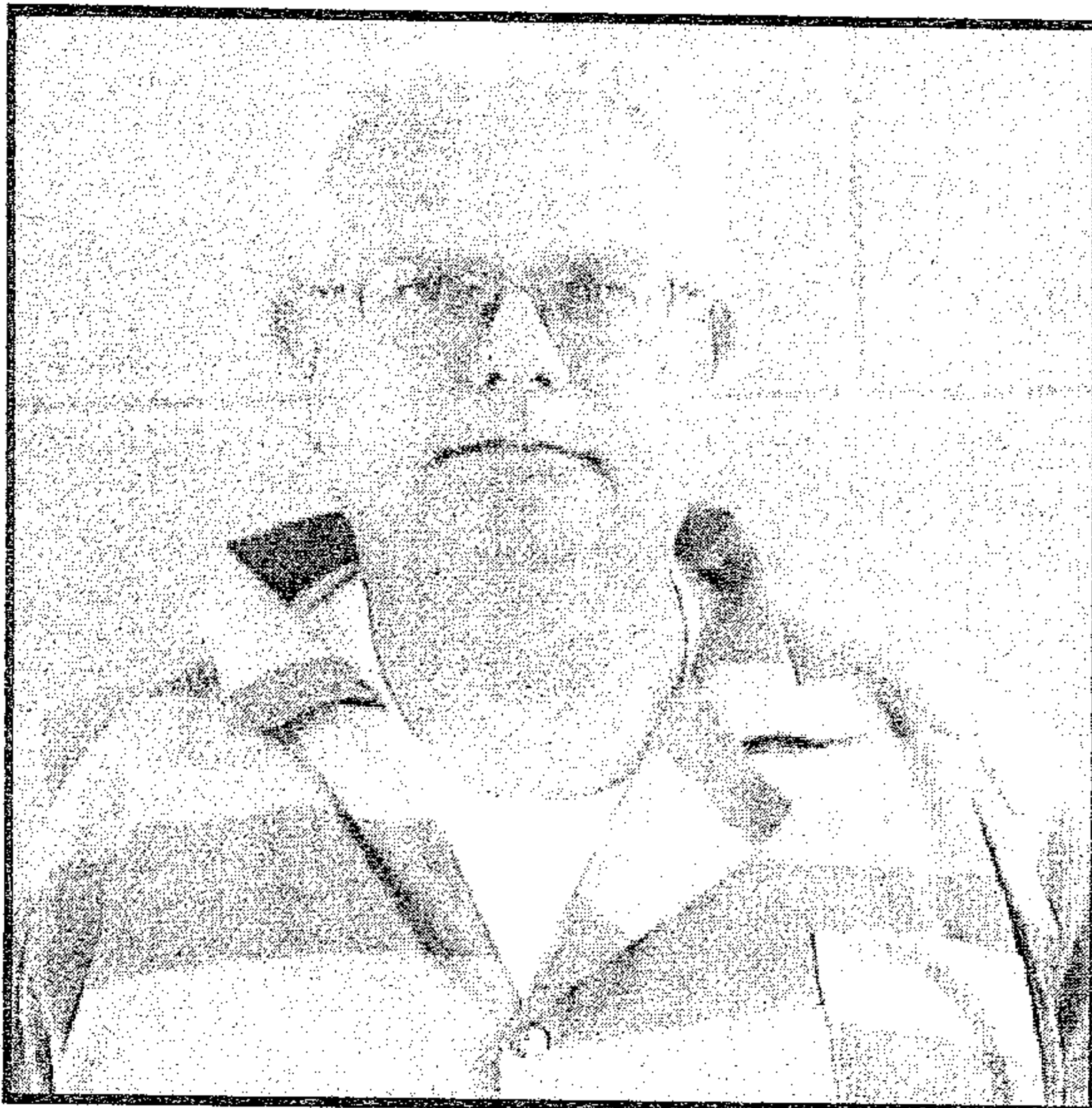

ATTORNEY KENT BOOHER ARRESTED

Loudon County Sheriff Tim Guider today announced the arrest on Wednesday, August 14, of Attorney Kent Booher, age 58, at Booher's home in Harriman, Tennessee. The arrest stems from indictments handed down from a Loudon County Grand Jury. Booher is charged with three (3) charges of Statutory Rape, and one charge

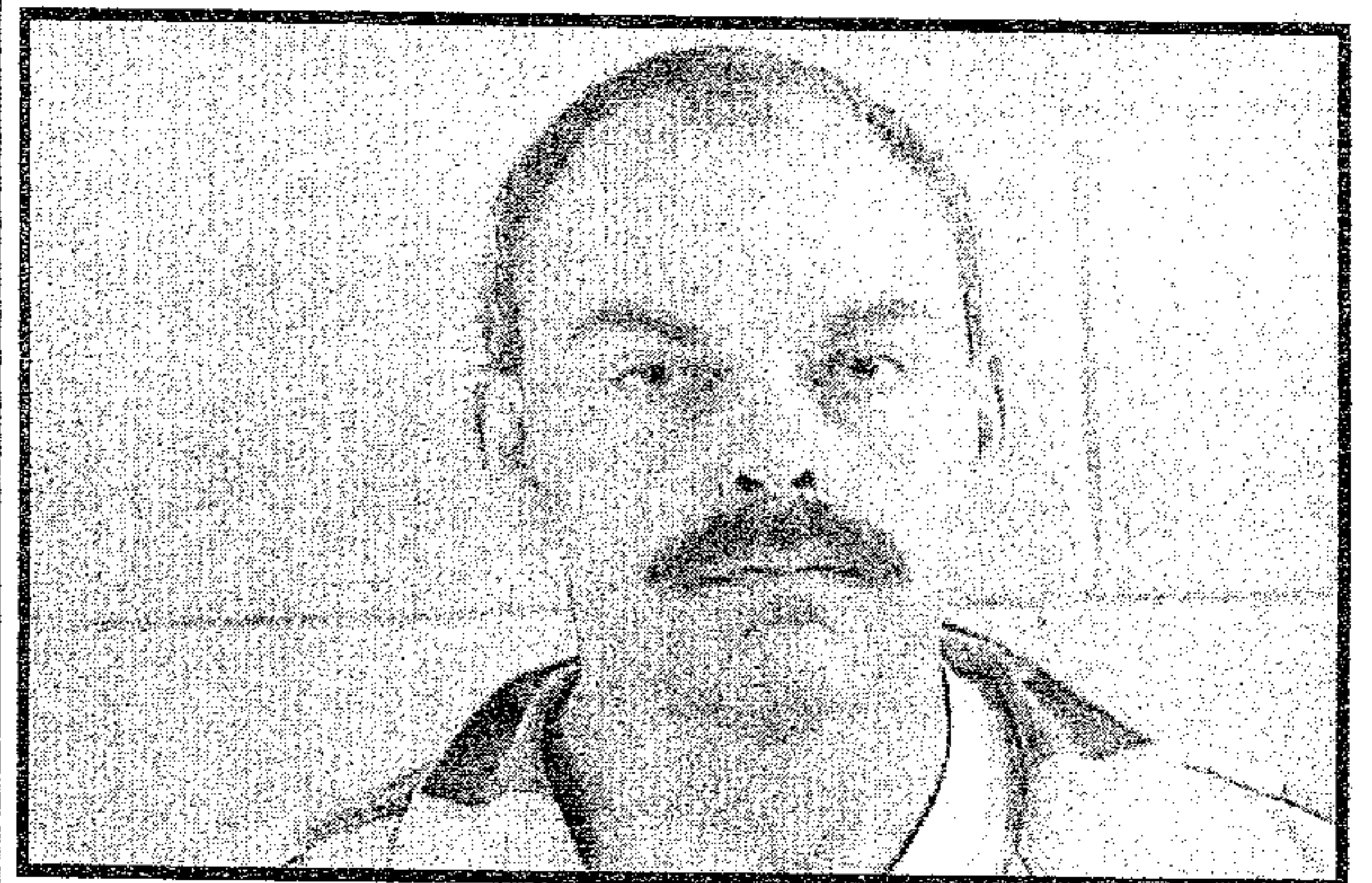
Guat's Up?

More Information on County Finances Now Available Online

The Transparency and Accountability for Governments in Tennessee (TAG) application provided by the Comptroller of the Treasury on its department web site gives citizens a transparent look at where government money comes from and where that money goes. Since 2010, TAG has allowed taxpayers to view detailed revenues and expenditures for county governments.

At the request of Sen. Randy McNally, R-Oak Ridge, the TAG application has been enhanced to include debt information. The user-friendly resource now provides access to outstanding debt for each of the 89 counties audited by the Comptroller's Division of Local Government Audit. Users can drill down on a county's total debt to see the types of debt outstanding. Total debt figures are also available for the six counties audited by certified public accounting firms. Per capita debt amounts for all counties are available, as well as graphs which compare each county's debt to the state average for county debt.

The upgrade to the TAG application also includes new functionality that allows users to evaluate revenue, expenditure and debt information for up to 95 counties. All of this information can be exported to Microsoft Excel for further analysis.

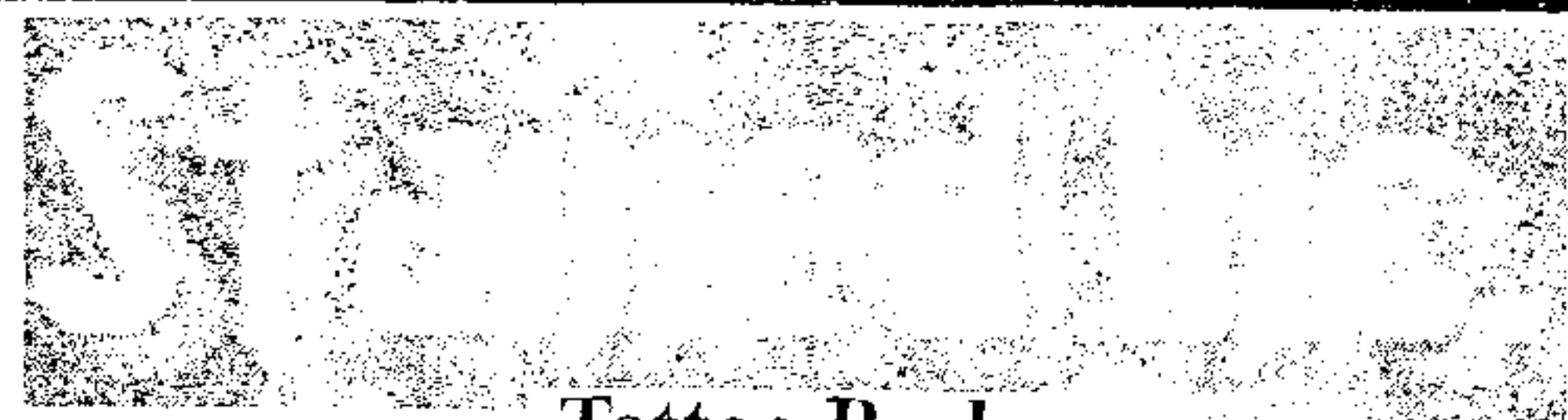

I am surrounded by coconut trees, a slow salty breeze and numerous birds are having an intense conversation among themselves nearby. My immediate surroundings this morning are indicative of an upscale resort on the beach back home, but the reality of our location outside of these hotel walls is much different.

Twenty yards from where I am sitting is the entrance gate to our hotel. The road is comprised of black volcanic sand, dirt and gravel. There is a huge pool of standing water as you exit the gate that doesn't dry up for months, as it is the rainy season with hard rains, thunder and lightening appearing not long after dark each night.

A completely different world exists as you exit this gate and enter the streets of Montericco.

Each morning as the sun rises, the local villagers begin to set up small booths along the roadside that are similar to what you and I see at a flea market. Most of these "vendors" are ladies who build small fires and flip tortillas all day long to sell for mere pennies and to feed their own family.

Some sell clothing items, coconuts or operate small convenient type stores called Tiendas. Some of the men have small wooden boats powered by push poles or old 5hp motors and they fish with simple nets or hand lines early in the morning before the scorching sun turns the town into a slow roasting

oven.

In this part of Guatemala, foot travel is the most common mode of transportation, although it is not uncommon to see three people (including small children) stacked up on a scooter or small motorcycle. Chickens, dogs and occasionally domestic pigs are among the pedestrians traveling the streets. It is also common to see children walking the streets with no adult supervision, although each village we have visited appears to be safer than those at home.

Yesterday morning Blondie and I had reservations to take a two hour boat tour of the mangrove inlet near town for about thirteen dollars. The owner of the hotel had made the arrangements for us and told us that our tour guide would pick us up at the gate at 5:00 am.

We waited just inside the gate and listened for the tour guide's vehicle to arrive so the "Boogie Man" wouldn't get us in the dark street prior to his arrival. While waiting for the sound of his approaching van we noticed someone with a flashlight approaching our hotel. It was our guide. How did he arrive without us hearing his vehicle we thought? As we followed his flashlight into the street the answer was right there in front of us, he was riding a bicycle! He was kind enough to push the bicycle and walk with us through the dark streets and across town to the boat ramp where our push pole powered wooden boat was waiting with about an inch of water already in it. The Mangrove tour was interesting and, despite the condition of our tour boat, we didn't drown along the way, although we didn't understand one word of his

narration of the points of interest along the tour.

The purpose of describing life in Guatemala, this small town and the lives of those who live here is only to remind us of why we pray for, financially support and encourage our missionary friends who serve The Lord by serving the people who call Guatemala home. These local folks are in need of someone to love them, assist them and more importantly share what it means to have a relationship with Jesus Christ.

Mathew 25:40 (NKJV) And the King will answer and say to them, "Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to me."

Each time Blondie and I visit Guatemala we return home feeling very selfish, very unappreciative and very aware that our lives as Christians should be much more than a Sunday

morning worship service. Many of the people living here have not heard the gospel of Christ proclaimed, they have not seen what a Christian life looks like and they live without the hope of the eternal happiness that is promised to those who love Christ and accept Him as Lord and Savior.

Romans 10:14-15 (NKJV) How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach unless they are sent? As it is written; "How beautiful are the feet of those who preach the gospel of peace, who bring glad tidings of good things!"

Blondie and I have a deep respect for the missionaries who leave their homes, families, jobs and friends to seek out and share the gospel with

the less fortunate around the world. We see but a glimpse in a short week or so from time to time but those who have committed their lives to make the gospel known in all nations are the folks we hail as heroes for the cause of Christ.

If today's message helps to open your eyes to the massive needs in Guatemala and around the globe then I pose this question; As a follower of Christ, what are you willing to do about it? Will you pray? Will you give? Will you go?
