collections and failed to deposit ticket money from at least six athletic events. She kept the cash for her own benefit.

Rebecca Daughtrey was arrested by the County Sequatchie Sheriff's Office and charged with theft over \$10,000.

"Schools are especially vulnerable to fraud, waste and abuse when one person receives and deposits all the money collected," said Comptroller Justin P. Wilson. "At the very least, an administrator should review the monthly bank statements. Unfortunately, Sequatchie County Middle School did not have these basic controls in place."

Additional individuals charged for their roles in operating "Pill Mills" in Knox and Loudon Counties

On Oct. 4, 2016, a federal grand jury in Knoxville returned a 13-count superseding indictment against Sylvia Hofstetter, 52, of Knoxville, Tenn.; Richard Larson, 80, of Dandridge, Tenn.; Alan Pecorella, 67, of West Orange, N.J.; Theodore Mc-Crary, 69, of Oak Ridge, Tenn.; Courtney Newman, 41, of Knoxville, Tenn.; and Cynthia Clemons, 44, of Knoxville,

Tenn., for their roles in a conspiracy to distribute and dispense oxycodone, oxymorphone, and morphine outside the scope of professional practice and not for a legitimate medical purpose, maintenance of drug-involved premises, distribution of oxycodone resulting in death, and money laundering. Pecorella's medical license was revoked in 2014 by the Tennessee Department of Health.

The superseding indictment on file with the U.S. District Court details the charges against each of the individuals referenced above. All are accused of being responsible for the distribution of a quantity of oxycodone, oxymorphone, and morphine sufficient to generate clinic revenue of at least \$17.5M.

If convicted, those charged in the indictment could be imprisoned from 20 years to life and ordered to pay fines up to \$1,000,000.

This superseding indictment is the result of an investigation by the FBI High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HID-TA), comprised of investigators assigned to the task force by the Loudon County Sheriff's Office, Knoxville Police Department, Blount County Sheriff's Office, Roane County Sheriff's Office, Harriman Police Department, and Clinton Police Department. The Tennessee Department of Health and the Drug Enforcement Administration's Knoxville Diversion Group also assisted in the investigation.

Assistant U.S. Attorneys Tracy L. Stone, Caryn Hebets, and Anne-Marie Svolto represent the United States in the prosecution of these cases.




