On Nov. 29. 2016, Billy Ray Allen, a.k.a. Grill, 42, of Widener, Ark., was sentenced by the Honorable R. Leon Jordan, U.S. District Court Judge, to serve 240 months in federal prison. Following his prison term, he will be on supervised release for ten years. There is no parole in the federal system.

Allen pleaded guilty in August 2016 to a conspiracy to distribute 280 grams or more of crack cocaine and
