


Loudon County Sex Offender Gets Sentenced to 18 Years in Prison

District Attorney General Russell Johnson announced that on Wednesday in Loudon County Criminal Court a defendant, Joseph Leslie Slusher (29 year old, W/M) formerly of Hotchkiss Valley Road in Loudon, pled guilty to two counts of aggravated sexual battery, Class B felonies. The case involved Slusher sexually molesting a young male child who was 8 years old at the time of the offenses.

It was September 15, 1963 when a bomb exploded inside the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama, killing four young girls and injuring countless others before Sunday worship.



The young victim lived in the home of Slusher in Lenoir City during a time frame of October 2012 through October 2013. The abuse was later disclosed to authorities in Arkansas where the victim had moved with his mother.


Upon his plea Slusher was sentenced by Judge Jeff Wicks to serve eighteen years

in the custody of the Tennessee Department of Corrections. Additionally, upon his release, he will be placed on the Sex Offender Registry and be subject to Community Supervision for Life, which is an enhanced form of probation for violent sex offenders. Though he will receive credit for the approximately two years that he has been in custody, because he was

convicted of a violent sexual offense, he will be required to serve eighty-five percent of his prison sentence before becoming parole eligible.

It was this act of violence and numerous other atrocities that ultimately led to the passage of the landmark Civil Rights Act of 1964, which provided the FBI with new federal laws to investigate civil rights violations.

Decades later, on the hallowed ground of the historic church, FBI Director James Comey recalled discrimination the African-Americans in Birmingham have faced during a speech today at the annual FBI and Birmingham Civil Rights Institute (BCRI) conference on law enforcement and civil rights.

"Too many have forgotten what it was like for men and women of color—for black people—in this city 50 years ago. But many of you here today remember, because many of you and your relatives lived it. Sep- 1865-414-3014

Comey's speech ended the two-day conference, which focused on the need to bridge the gap between law enforcement and the community, particularly in communities of color. As violent crimes increase in many parts of the country—including Birmingham, where 2015 brought on 88 homicides—Comey discussed how the lines between citizens and police are moving further apart. To change this trend, the FBI Director stressed the importance of developing a deeper understanding and a stronger connection.






