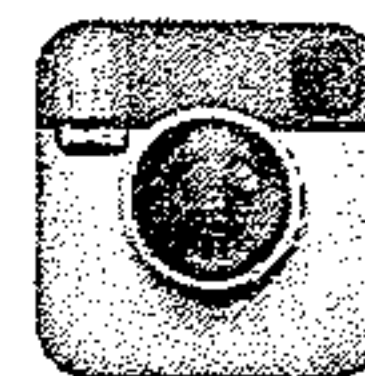

Neal admitted that he then stabbed victim in the chest with a large two edged dagger he carries on his person. Neal admitted to Officer that he knew Deaton was unarmed when he stabbed Deaton in the upper right side of his chest.

Victim sustained serious bodily injury and was treated at Fort Loudon Medical Center ER before being transported to UT Medical Center for further treatment.

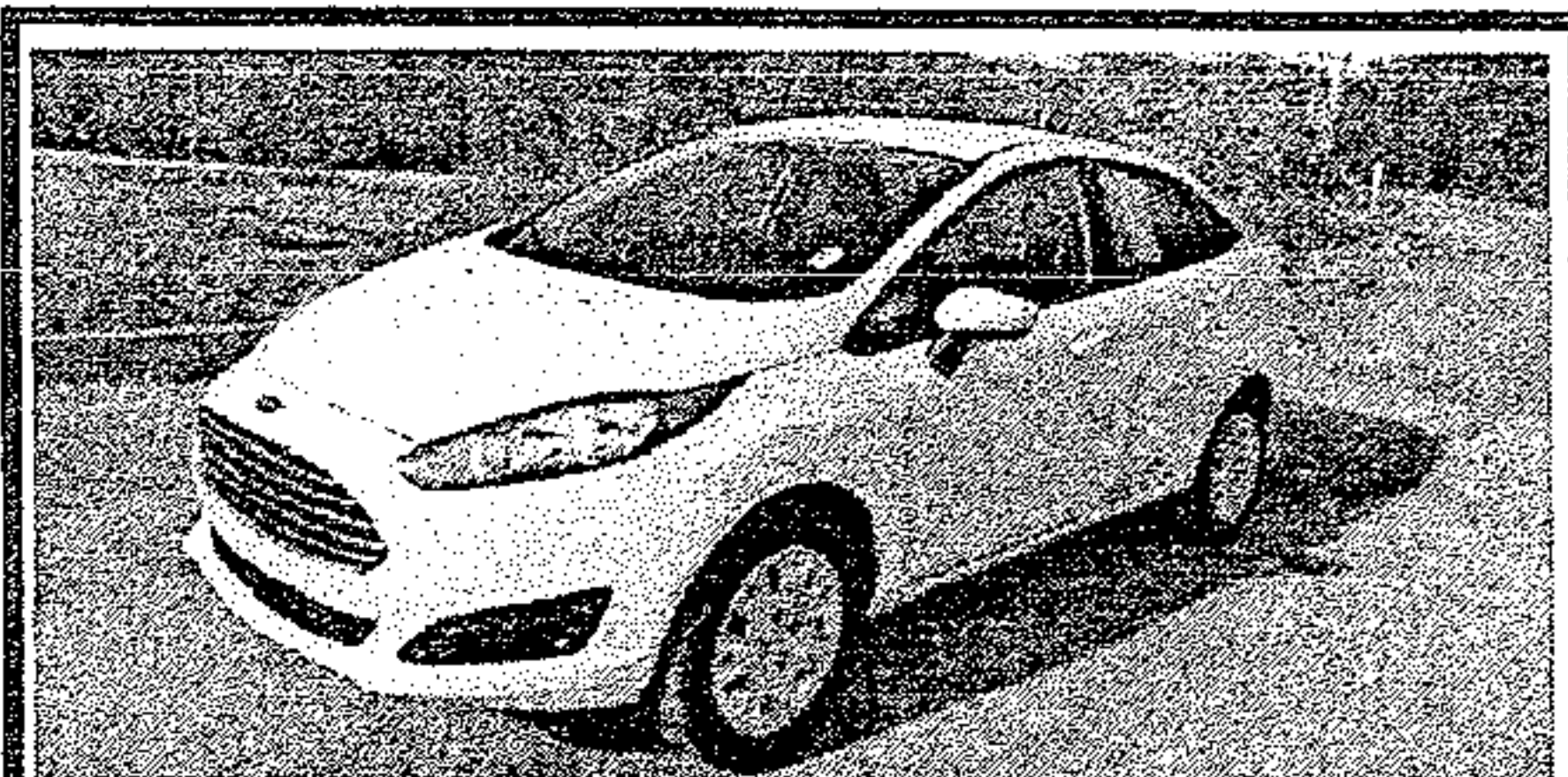

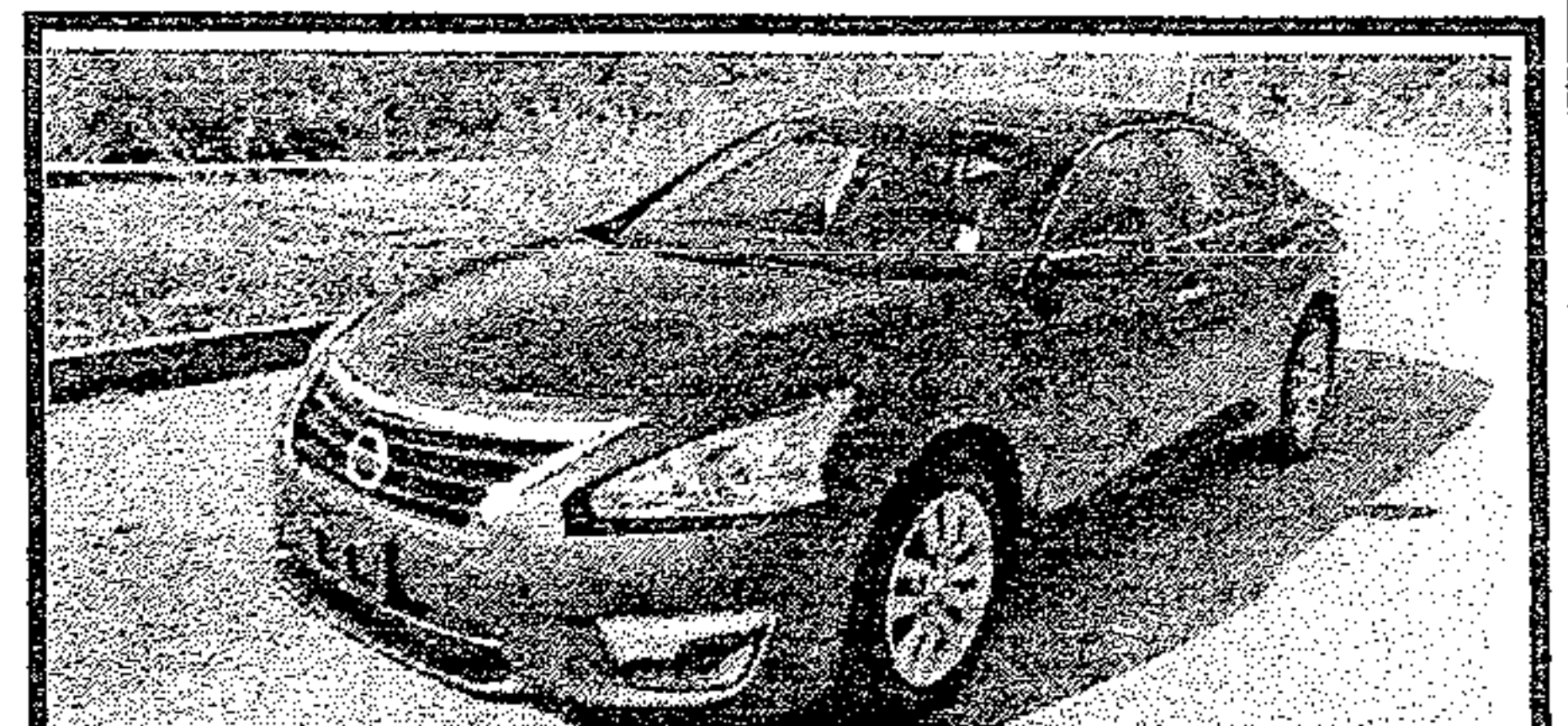

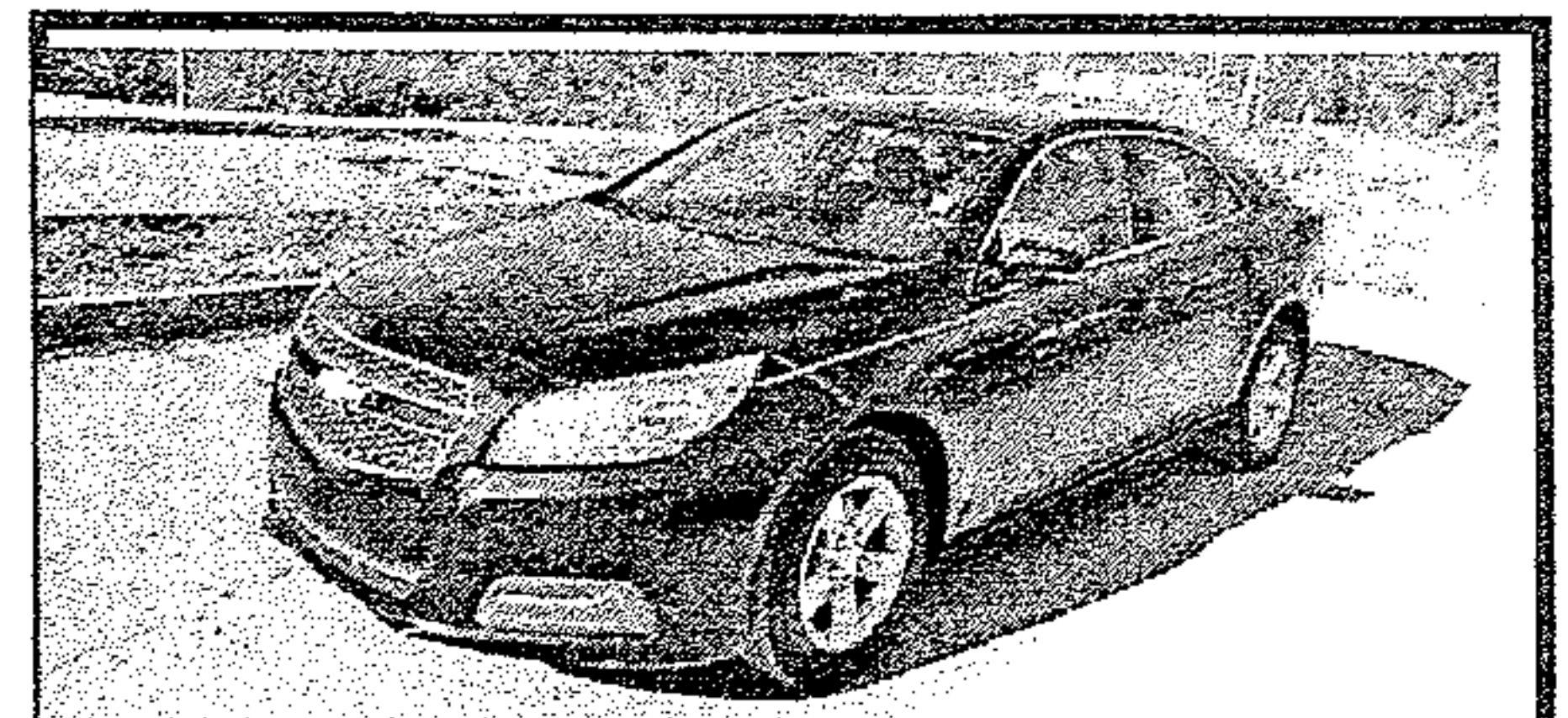

Whitney Lynn, 32, Valley Vista Drive Loudon, was charged with DUI, Driving on Revoked/Suspended License, Violation of Probation, Legend Drug, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Jennifer Bahr, 37, Strawberry Hill Philadelphia, was charged with Assisting other Agency.

Trooper Rodney Best THP, observed a silver vehicle with a female driver that was known to have suspended license. Trooper traffic stopped the vehicle and identified the driver as Whitney Lynn, and passengers Jennifer Bahr, and Joel Lynn, who appeared to be real nervous. After running the individuals through dispatch Whitney came back suspended, Jennifer had two warrants out of Bradley Co. FBI

On Friday, February 17, the group visited the National Museum of African American History and Culture. There, participants saw poignant exhibits,

including an interactive lunch counter lined with stools from the Woolworth store in Greensboro; North Carolina, the site of many sit-ins and protests against racial segregation.

Participants in the African-American FBI Special Agents Symposium visit the National Museum of African American History & Culture on February 17, 2017.

The next day, they

heard remarks from Director James Comey, who thanked the former and active agents on hand for their significant contributions to the FBI. When he became FBI Director, Comey add-

ed diversity as a core value of the organization and redoubled the Bureau's efforts to recruit more African-Americans and women to the ranks of special agents.

"The FBI operates in every community of this country," Comey told the group. "To accomplish the goal of protecting the American people and upholding the Constitution of the United States, we have to be effective." Without diversity in the organization, he explained, "we are less effective."

The group also went to a wreath-laying ceremony at the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial, where they had the opportunity to make stone rubbings of the names of those who had died in the line of duty. Later on Saturday, during a visit to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial, the group gathered for a photo to mark the event.

That evening, Lee Woodriffe, daughter of Special Agent Edwin Woodriffe—the only African-American FBI agent killed in the line of duty—was presented with an American flag that had been flown over the Washington Field Office, the National Museum of African American History and Culture, the Pentagon, the Washington Metropolitan Police Department, and the U.S. Capitol.

Sunday morning, the final day of the symposium, participants took part in a "Blessing of the Badge" ceremony.

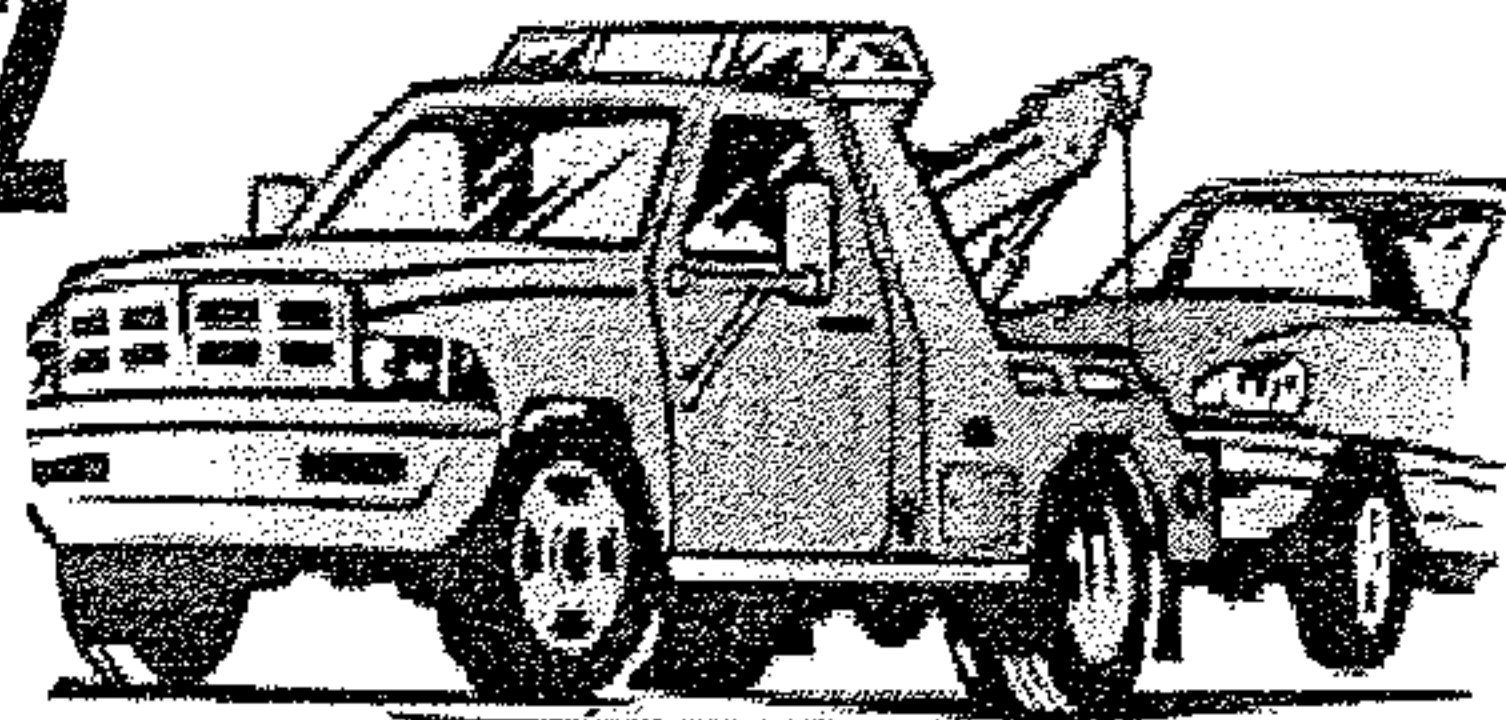

Shooter

Daniel Stinnett, 27, Ferry Street Loudon, was charged with Domestic Assault Felony x2, Aggravated Robbery, and Aggravated Assault.

Corporal Rondel M. Branam along with Deputy Billy Lewis, was dispatched to Corinth Church Road in reference to a possible domestic violence involving a firearm. Prior to arrival dispatch advised that the male subject had an AR-15 style rifle and he had fired it in the residence and was pointing it at the victims. Deputy Lewis arrived in the area and advised dispatch that he could hear gunshots in the area possibly behind the residence. Deputy continued up

the driveway in his fully marked Loudon County Sheriff's Office Patrol Car and just prior to arriving at the residence he saw the front door of the residence slam. When Deputy advised of this over the residence Cpl. advised him to back down the driveway at which point he did. Deputy stopped his patrol car half way down the lengthy driveway and retrieved his AR-15 rifle from his car and moved to cover behind the rear of his vehicle. Deputy advised over the radio at that time that he had been shot at. Cpl. Branam arrived on scene at approximately and took cover behind his vehicle. Cpl. did observe a white Lexus LS400 coming down the driveway towards

Deputy patrol vehicle. Dispatch did confirm with the complainant that the vehicle was occupied by the suspect, Daniel Stinnett, and that he still had the rifle in his possession. At that point Cpl. moved to a residence to take cover along the right hand side of it.

Cpl. observed Daniel Stinnett exit the vehicle and walked toward Deputy and Deputy Kenneth Palmer. Daniel stopped and attempted to open Deputy Lewis patrol vehicle and refused to comply with commands and returned to the drivers seat of his vehicle. Cpl. did hear Daniel working the action of his rifle while he was sitting in the drivers seat of the vehicle. After a short time Daniel exited his vehicle again and walked towards Deputy Lewis and Palmer and complied with commands. At that time approximately 6:40 PM Daniel was taken into custody. Daniel was transported by Deputy JC Shultz to Fort Loudon Medical Center due to his intoxication.

Cpl. did respond to the residence and

spoke with both victims along with Deputy Travis Estes. Deputy did clear the residence and Deputy Kenneth Palmer got statements from the victims. It was learned from the statements that Daniel had come to the residence angry, and intoxicated. Daniel was angry because his family turned him in to the Social Security Board for lying on his Food Stamp paperwork about his place of residence. Both victims stated that Daniel had an AR-15 rifle and was demanding Xanax pills. Victim refused to give Daniel the pills at which point he became irate and started pointing the gun at both victims. During the time in the residence victim and Daniel got in to a physical altercation.

According to victim Daniel did shoot the rifle at her while she was sitting on the coach and did fire more rounds inside the home then fled out the back door. Victims locked the doors of the residence and was contacted next by Cpl. Branam and Deputy Estes. All occurred in Loudon County, TN
