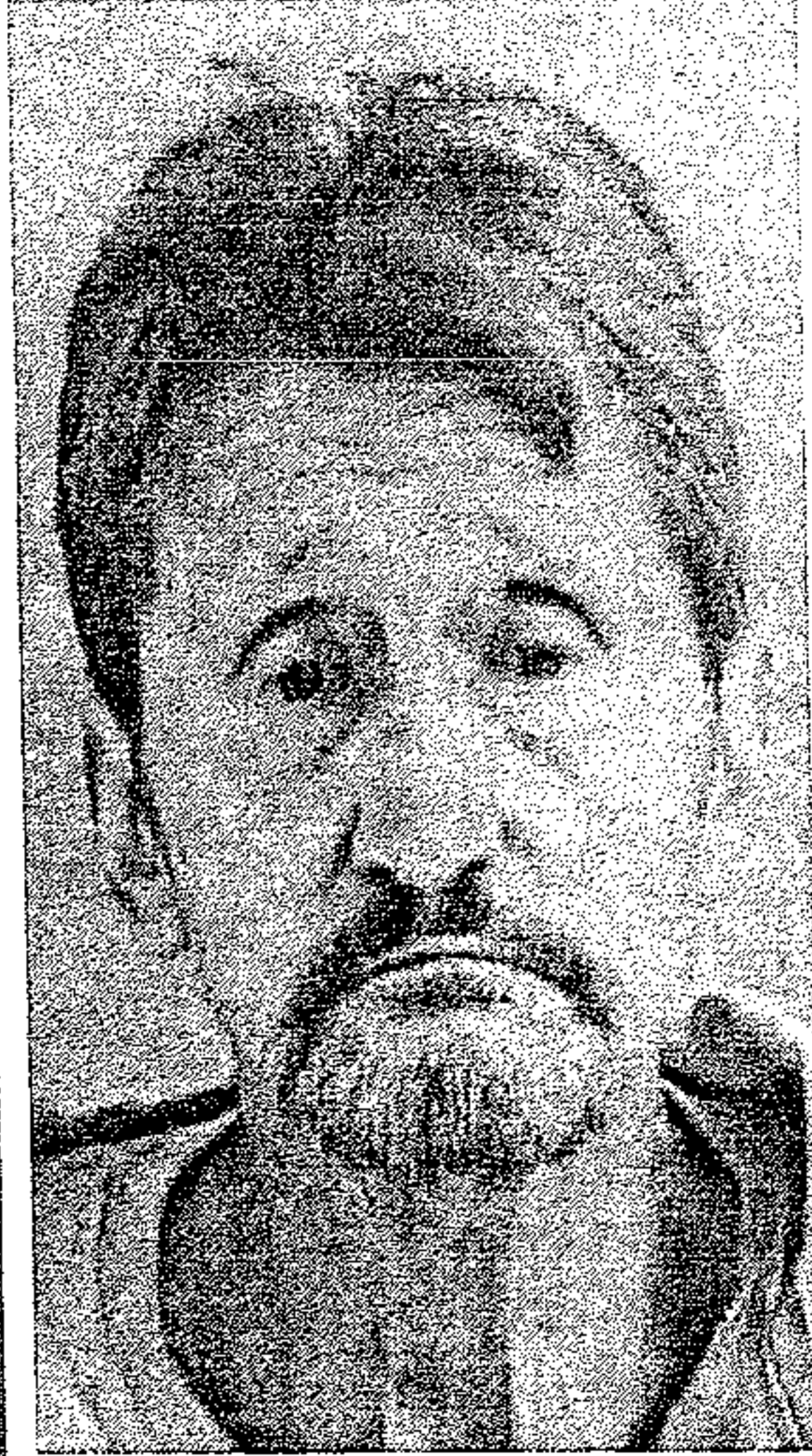

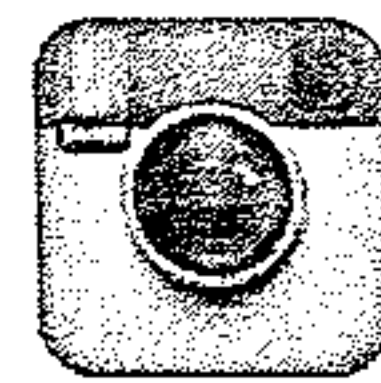
National Police Week 2017 FBI Remembers Fallen Heroes

In one of many events leading up to National Police Week, attendees gathered for the annual Blue Mass, held at St. Patrick's Catholic Church on May 2, 2017 in Washington, D.C.

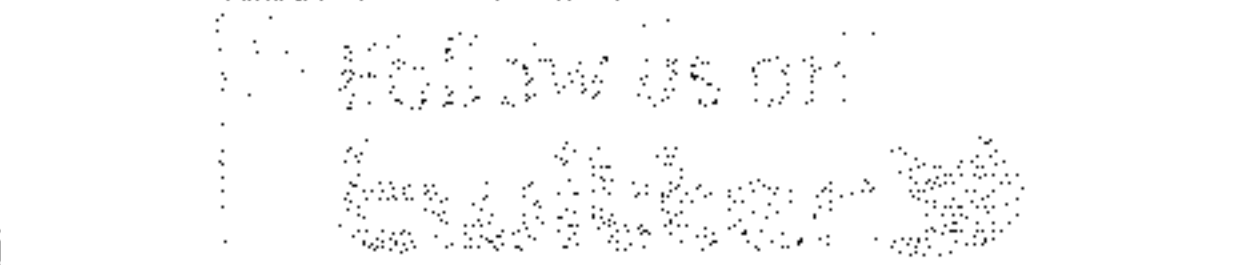
The FBI last week honored seven special agents who responded to the 9/11 attacks and later died from illnesses linked to their ex-

posure to toxic air and hazardous materials at the sites. The agents were recognized as part of National Police Week, an annual event that draws thousands of law enforcement officers to Washington, D.C. each May to honor their fallen colleagues.

Cody Ake, 26, Campbell Lake Drive Knoxville, was charged with Possession of Drug Para., and Simple Possession.

Tiffany Long, 33, Dandridge Avenue Knoxville, was charged with Poss. of Drug Para., Identity Theft, and Theft of Property.

Deputy Bobby Hamilton badge LCSO, did respond to Buttermilk Rd. to a stolen vehicle out of Knox. Co. Tn. that had been located by Onstar. The vehicle was a 2014 Chevy Malibu red in color tag #R21-

92J . When Deputy arrived he encountered three subjects that were working on the stolen vehicle. Cody Ake, Jeff and Crystal. Deputy did detain all three defendants. Deputy then ran the tag of the stolen vehicle and it was confirmed as a stolen vehicle out of Knox. Co. Tn. The defendants also had another vehicle there. A 2006 Suzuki Reno four door red in color. Deputy and Cpl. Pete McGinnley LCSO, searched Cody Ake and Deputy asked him if he could search him for drugs and weapons and he gave permission. We did find a necklace with a glass vial

which contained some type of a crystal substance in it in his right front pocket. When Deputy inventoried the 2006 Suzuki Reno that all three defendant claimed to have been in. Deputy found two syringes and several empty plastic bag-

gies and a Meth pipe. Deputy did contact Det. Charlie Cosner and narcotics Jamie Kenter and Marty Stanley. Jamie did test the crystal substance that Mr. Ake had and it tested positive as Meth. During investigation (see theft ctd. pg. 5)

Devin Barber, 24, West Adair Knoxville, was charged with Contraband in a Penal Institution, Legend Drug, and Public Intoxication.

Deputy JC Schultz LCSO, answered a suspicious person (intoxicated person) call at the Red Top market on Hwy 11. Upon arrival Ms. Devin Marie Barber was walking down Hwy 11 in

the road way. Deputy activated his emergency equipment and tried talking to Ms. Barber who was sweating profusely, had red bloodshot eyes, and needle tracks on her arms. Ms. Barber was agitated and excited and was obviously under the influence of some stimulant. She stated that she had been with a man she met on facebook that had shot her up with Methamphetamine yesterday.

Deputy asked Ms. Barber if she had any syringes on her and she said she did in her purse. Ms Barber was arrested for public intoxication and was advised that if she had anything on her person she needed to let him know before she got to the jail or it would be a felony charge of contraband in a penal institution. Ms. Barber was transported to the Loudon County Jail by this Deputy where 5 syringes were disposed of in the sharps container and

several white rock substances that Ms. Barber advised was seroquel, and a clear baggie with white rocks (that Ms. Barber advised was crack) were found inside her left front pocket. Ms. Barber was warned multiple times about introducing contraband into the jail and she stated that she had nothing on her it was all inside her purse. The drugs were sent to the lab for identification. This did occur in Loudon County, TN.

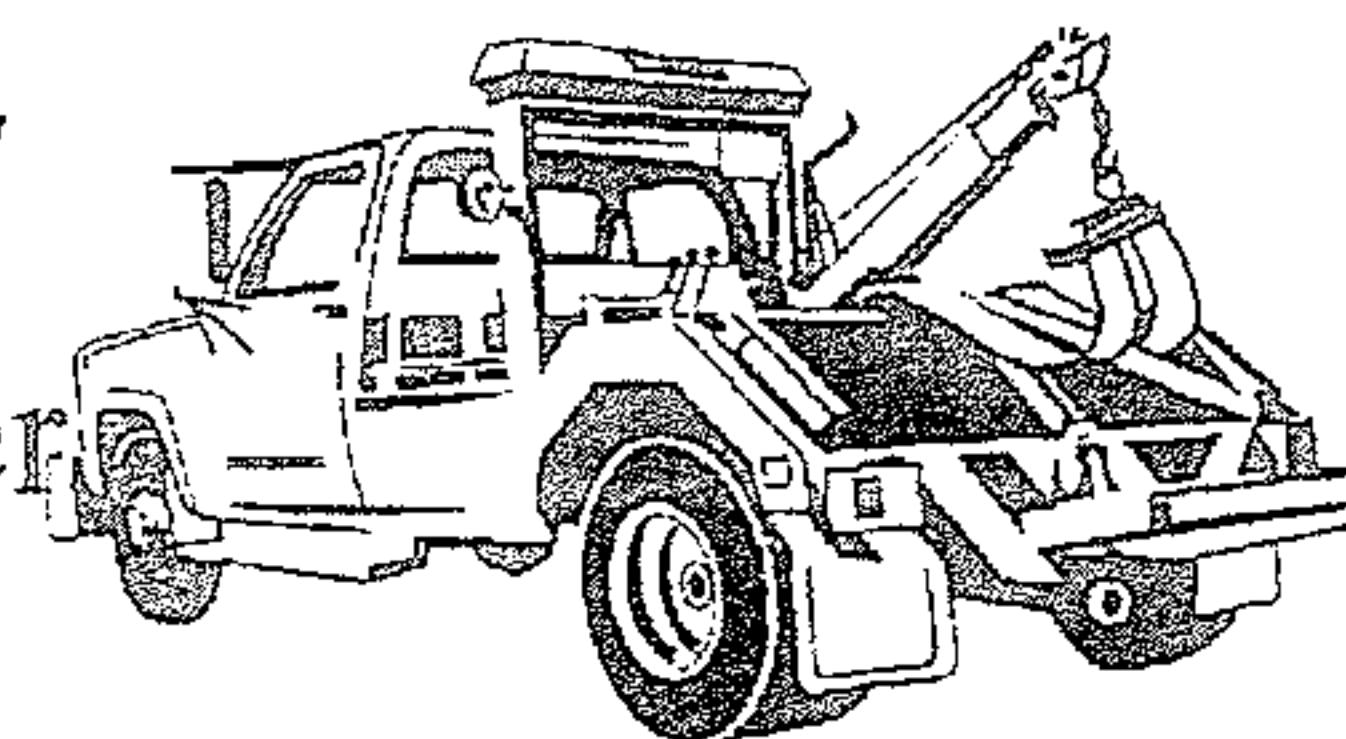

FBI

Special Agents Steven Carr, William Craig, Jerry Jobe, Robert Roth, Gerard Senatore, Paul Wilson, and Wesley Yoo were among the FBI personnel who recovered the deceased and gathered critical evidence in the largest investigation in FBI history. After scientists confirmed a connection between 9/11 responders and their illnesses, the agents—who passed away between 2007 and 2015—were added to the FBI’s Hall of Honor this week. They ranged in age from 44 to 68 at the time of their deaths.

During a memorial service on May 17 at FBI Headquarters for all agents who have died in the line of duty,

FBI Acting Director Andrew McCabe called the fallen 9/11 responders “peacemakers dedicated to protecting the lives of Americans.”

“They did their jobs not knowing that responding to the scene of a tragic attack would set into motion another tragedy that they would not realize until many years later,” he said.

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy designated May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week in which it falls as National Police Week. Multiple events are held in the nation’s capital each year in the days leading up to and during the week, including a candlelight vigil, a Blue Mass at St. Patrick’s Catholic Church, a wreath-lay-

ing ceremony at the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial, and several others.

This year’s events were underscored by the release of a preliminary FBI report that shows 66 law enforcement officers were feloniously killed last year in the line of duty. An additional 52 officers were killed in line-of-duty accidents, according to preliminary statistics compiled by the Bureau’s Uniform Crime Reporting Program, which will release a full report, Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted, 2016, in the fall.

During the 29th annual candlelight vigil, held May 13, 2017 on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., the names of officers added to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial wall earlier this year were read aloud and formally dedicated. FBI Acting Director Andrew McCabe was among those who paid tribute to the fallen.

Recognition of the deceased FBI agents

made this National Police Week especially poignant. Six of the agents’ names were etched into the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial wall—which displays more than 20,000 names of law enforce-

ment officers killed in the line of duty since 1791—and the seventh will be added next year.

We later learned Crystal real identity as Tiffany Nacole Long. She had been giving us her sisters name, DOB, and SS # to hide her identity. Deputy did place defendants under arrest for poss. of drug para, simple poss./causal exchange and identity theft. This did occur in Loudon Co. Tn.

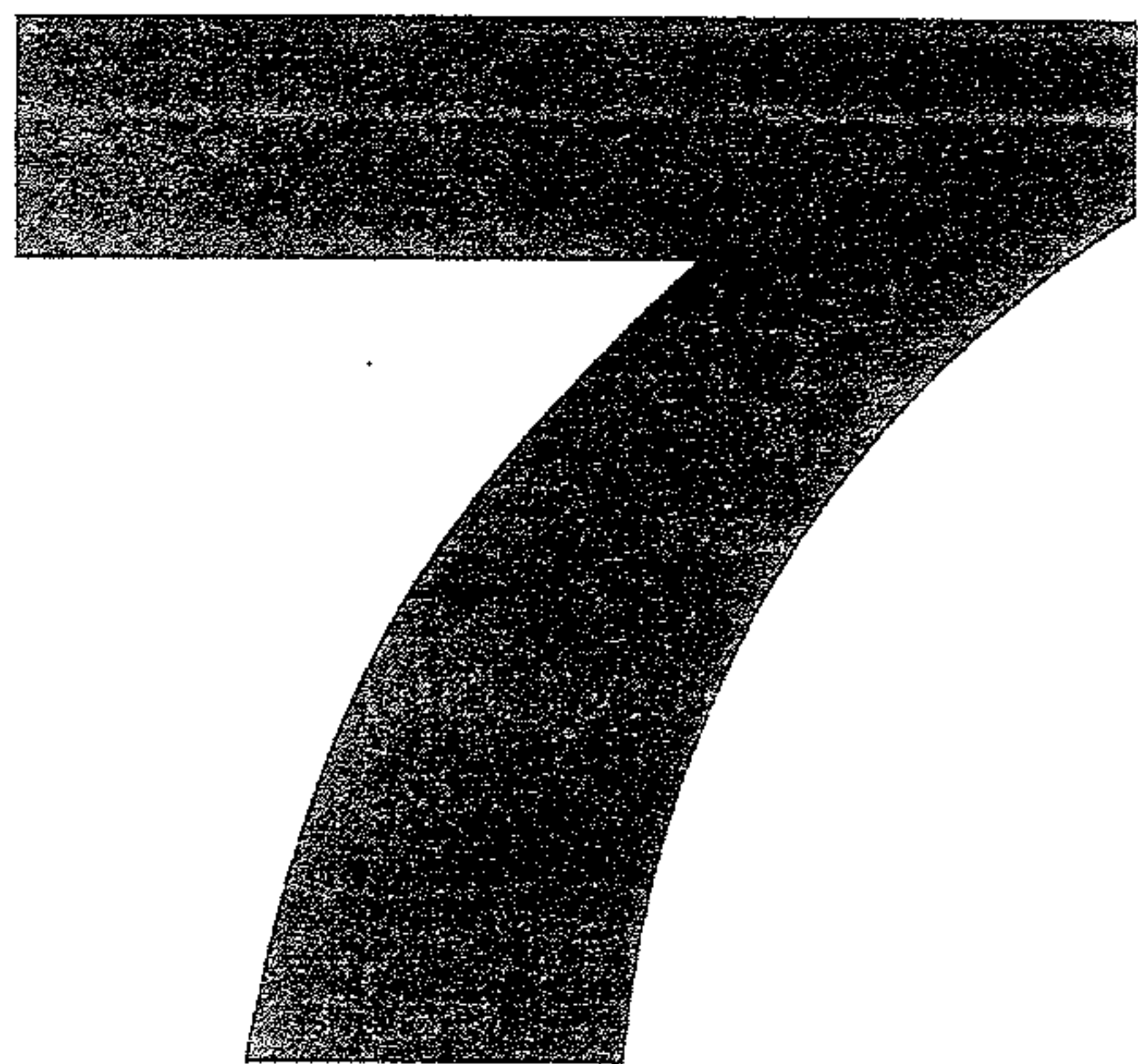

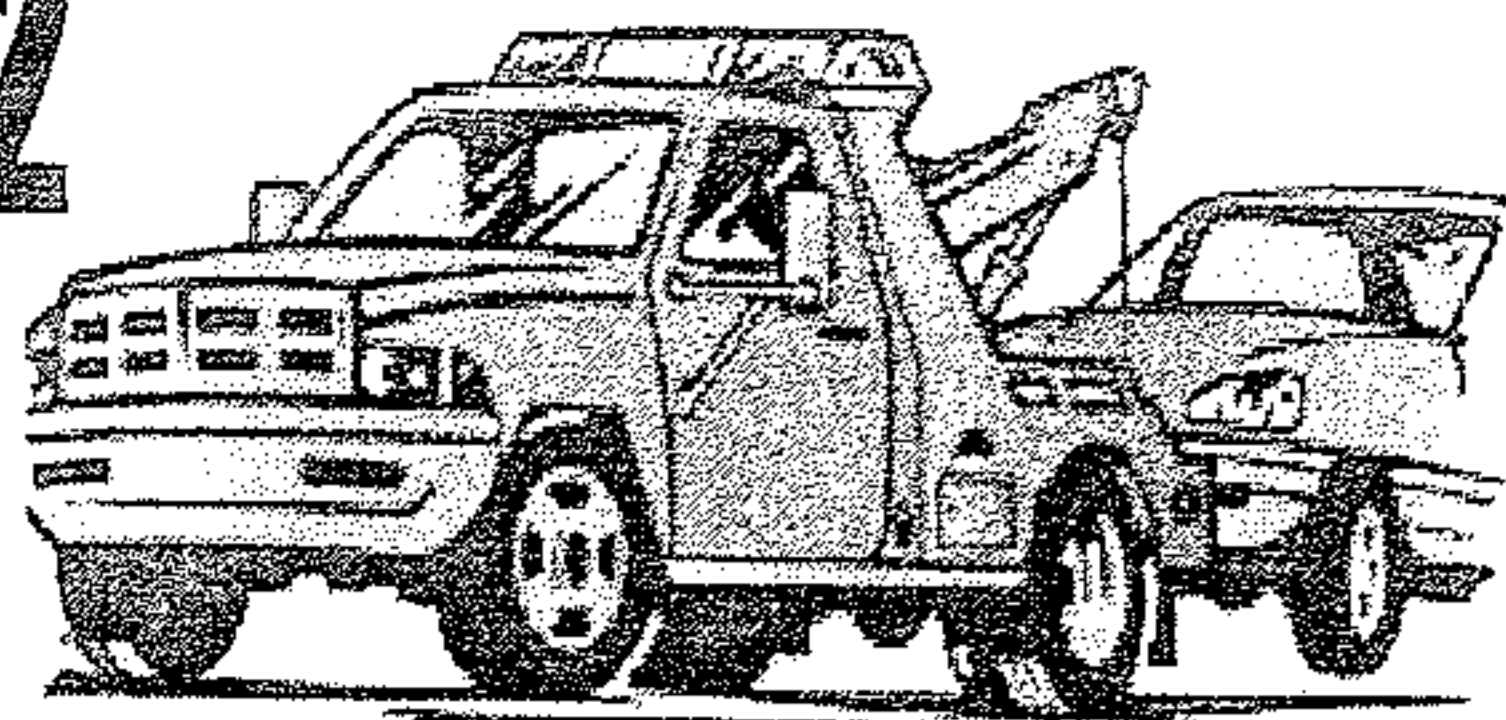

PUBLIC NOTICE

WATER SYSTEM FLUSHING PROGRAM

The Lenoir City Utilities Board (LCUB) and Lenoir City Fire Department will be conducting our semi-annual water distribution system wide flushing program per Tennessee Department of Environment & Conservation Water Quality Control Requirements. The Flushing Program will occur for LCUB customers on Monday, May 22, 2017, from 6:00 p.m. until 2:00 a.m. thru Thursday, May 25, 2017, until 3:00 pm. The program goals are to identify problems in the water system and ultimately have them corrected. When fire hydrants are flowed, iron deposits in the water lines become agitated. This may cause a brown discoloration to the water in the area which is being flushed. This condition is only temporary and will normally correct itself in a number of hours. During this period of flushing, LCUB recommends that you flow your cold water prior to use to determine if there is any discoloration. While the water is still safe for consumption, we recommend not laundering white clothes without first testing the water for discoloration. If your water is discolored, it will clear up on its own under normal usage over a period of time. It is also best to limit the use of your hot water until the water flows clear as this will keep the iron deposits from going into your water heater. You may also notice a drop in water pressure during these times; however, the water pressure should return to normal within a short period of time. If you continue to experience difficulty with your water pressure or continue to have discoloration of water on Monday, May 29, 2017, please contact LCUB at (865) 988-0700 to report the problem.
