According to his plea agreement on file with U.S. District Court, Beasley admitted that he was responsible for at least 1.5 kilograms but less than 4.5 kilograms of actual methamphetamine. Beasley sold methamphetamine to an individual cooperating on behalf of law enforcement (see Beasley pg. 4)

five separate occasions between February and June 2015. A search warrant executed at his residence in Morristown in June 2015 produced over an ounce of methamphetamine and multiple firearms.

Even after execution of the search warrant, Beasley continued to sell methamphetamine. In July 2015, he sold another quantity of methamphetamine to an individual working on behalf of law enforcement. During this recorded transaction, Beasley said he had sold six ounces the previous day. In September 2015, Beasley wrecked his motorcycle in Morristown while carrying approximately 55 grams of methamphetamine, 11.6 grams of Psi-

locin mushrooms and a firearm. He tossed nearby bushes to hide them from law enforcement and emergency personnel responding to the crash. Beasley told his wife, co-defendant Darinda Beasley, 37, of Morristown, Tennessee, to take the firearm and hide it from the police as well.
