

Lester Deville, 49, Pleasant, Lane Louisiana, was charged with DUI.

· Officer Carroll LCPD, was dispatched to Chick-Fil-A on a suspicious vehicle. Upon arrival, Officer made contact with a silver Ford pickup itruck bearing Louisiana tag# C809015 with 2 male subjects inside in the drive thru. While, speaking with the male subjects, Officer noticed a strong odor of alcohol omitting from the vehicle, as well as a tall glass bottle of Bourbon alcohol, both male subjects also had very slurred speech, and watery, blood shot eyes. The driver was identified as Lester Lee Deville Jr. Mr. Deville was in the driver seat, and in complete control of the vehicle.

The passenger was identified as Devlin Seth Walker. Mr. Walker advised that he was released from federal prison 3 days ago, and was walking down Oak Ridge Pkwy when Mr. Deville stopped, and asked if he needed a ride. Mr. Walker had no place to go, and was heavily intoxicated, and was a danger to himself, as well as the public.

Mr. Deville did consent to performing Standardized Field Sobriety Testing to make sure he was okay to be operating the vehicle. During the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus, Mr. Deville had a hard time focusing on my finger, and uncontrollable jerking of the eyes when Nystagmus was at maximum deviation. During the Walk and Turntest, Mr. Deville stepped off line numerous times,

missed heel to toe numerous times, used his arms for balance, and kept having to recount his steps. During the One-leg stand test, Mr. Deville did use his arms for balance, kept bending his standing leg to help with balance, and put his foot down multiple times. Mr. Deville was placed into cus-

tody for Driving Under the Influence. While in custody, Mr. Deville was read Implied Consent, and agreed to a blood draw. Mr. Deville was transported to Fort Loudon Medical Center for a blood draw, and then transported to the Jail without any further incident. This did occur in Lenoir City, TN.





"He claims to be committed to working on his reform and doing what is right – he now has more than a decade to demonstrate that commitment while he remains incarcerated."

Luke Sommer was originally sentenced to 24 years in prison on December 12, 2008, for Conspiracy to Commit Armed Bank Robbery, Armed Bank Robbery, Brandishing a Firearm During and in Relation to a Crime of Violence, and Possession of an Unregistered Destructive Device - Hand Grenade. Sommer was the mastermind of the August 7, 2006, robbery of a Tacoma branch of Bank of America. Five men, including Sommer, participated in the robbery. Two were armed with fully automatic AK-47 machine guns. Sommer and another man carried loaded semi-automatic handguns. The men wore soft body armor to protect themselves in case of a shoot-out with police and carried hundreds of rounds of extra ammunition. Sommer told the others that he wanted to use the proceeds of the robbery to start a crime family to rival the Hell's Angels in British Columbia, Canada. The men escaped with more than \$50,000 but were quickly tracked down and arrested thanks to an alert citizen who noted the license plate of the getaway car.

Today, three victims of the bank robbery told the court how they suffered following the crime with post-traumatic stress and anxiety. The former branch manager described how she saw the red dot of Sommer's laser site pointed at her young tellers. "The staff was never the same, I will never be the same," the branch manager said.

In addition to the bank robbery, in 2010 Sommer was convicted of offering an undercover FBI task force officer as much as \$20,000 for murdering an Assistant United States Attorney. Law enforcement was alerted to Sommer's interest in hiring a hit man in January 2009, barely a month after Sommer was sentenced for the bank robbery. Sommer moved forward with the plot in March 2009, when he tried to hire the undercover officer telling him he wanted news reports of the hit to reflect that it was "murder not an accident."

Additionally, on January 23, 2009, Sommer used a prison-made knife to attack a co-defendant in the bank

robbery case. The two men were to be housed separately at the Federal Detention Center at SeaTac, but Sommer schemed to get to the other man's prison unit with the weapon. Sommer attacked the other inmate, fighting until the two were pulled apart by staff. Sommer continued to yell and threaten the safety of the victim. Although the victim suffered a minor stab wound and multiple abrasions, neither man had to be hospital-

ized.

In reducing Sommer's sentence, Judge Robart noted that "punishment is not vengeance or retaliation." The judge said he put weight on the letters from Bureau of Prisons staff who indicate Sommer has "worked hard to do the right thing while incarcerated."

Assistant United States Attorneys Todd Greenberg and Teal Miller handled the resentencing.
