



Deputy Rogers LCSO, observed a dark colored van operating with only one headlight while South on Hwy 11. Once following the vehicle, Deputy observed it also had a brake light out. Deputy initiated a traffic stop in the area of Stamford Bridge and made contact with the four occupants. The male rear passenger identified himself multiple times as Clayton Demons with different spellings and different dates of birth each time Deputy asked. Deputy then asked if he had an active warrant, to which he stated he had a warrant in Marshall County, and that his name was Cory Hood. Deputy checked all four subjects; Margaret Helms (driver), Steven Lee (front passenger), and Felicia Pierce (rear passenger). It was confirmed that Ms. Helms had an active Loudon County warrant, and Mr. Hood had an active Marshall County warrant. Marshall County advised they would not pick up. Deputy spoke with all oc-cupants individually and all admitted to using meth within the last twenty-four hours. Mr. Hood and Ms. Pierce stated they had used meth within the hour. Ms. Helms stated there was paraphernalia in the vehicle but was unaware of any narcotics. Deputy also located one baggie with meth residue and one bag with a Xanax bar within Ms. Helms' jacket. A search of the vehicle produced numerous baggies, meth pipes, cut straws and syringes with drug residue. One meth pipe contained a large amount of meth residue that had not

been smoked. One occupant stated they were all about to pass around and share the meth pipe. A considerable amount of paraphernalia was found in every area of the vehicle along with multiple baggies that contained a usable amount of meth. None of the meth or paraphernalia was claimed by any of the occupants. Based on the totality of the circumstances, all four subjects were taken

into custody for Possession of Meth and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Once at the jail Ms. Pierce stated she was concealing "dope" within her vagina however no narcotics were found. Mr. Hood was also charged with Criminal Impersonation. Ms. Helm was also served with her active warrant. Said did occur in Loudon County, TN.






cluded targeted compromises of energy sector entities and individuals and engineers who worked with industrial control systems (ICS) and supervisory control and data acquisition (SCADA) systems. Collectively, these intrusions could have had a devastating impact on energy delivery worldwide.

The first phase stretched between at least 2012 and 2014 and resulted in Havex being downloaded onto more than 17,000 unique devices in the United States and other nations. An FBI intelligence analyst who worked on the case said the group had used a combination of techniques to deploy Havex, including sweeping efforts to cast a wide net across the global energy sector, but also well-researched and targeted techniques to reach specific companies and individuals.

Among the more alarming

techniques used with Havex was the conspiracy's compromise of a company that manufactures equipment and software used by ICS/SCA-DA systems. These are the control and safety mechanisms that exist within energy production facilities and other operational environments. For safety reasons, these are typically closed systems. But because the group had gained access into the systems of a company that provides a component of these systems, they were able to hide their malware within software updates offered by the company—a technique known as a supply chain attack.

Regardless of how the Havex malware was deployed, the analyst said it could be tailored for a variety of uses, including gathering credentials and scanning for human-machine interfaces. "That means the ways a human may inter-

face with the system to tell it what to do," he said. "If that interface is connected to a network, you have the potential for a remote actor to send instructions to a critical network." In 2014, the group ceased using Havex after it was publicly exposed, and they began evolving the op-

The second phase involved targeted intrusions of energy sector companies, including an intrusion in 2017 of the business network of a nuclear power plant in Kansas. This business network was not directly connected to any ICS/SCADA devices. An FBI special agent who investigated the case said they found no evidence that the hackers took any sensitive data of intelligence value, and it appeared the goal was simply to gain and maintain access. "Meaning that, at a later date, they could have used this access to affect or damage the energy grid

or other critical operations within the United States," the agent explained.

The Kansas intrusion in 2017 was part of a multipronged attack. "When we peeled away at the onion, we found this was a much larger campaign targeting the global energy sector to the tune of about 500 companies worldwide," said the agent. "We believe they targeted nearly 3,300 people through a months-long spearphishing campaign." As part of this phase, the group is also accused of breaching the network of a U.S. construction company. Access to that network allowed the group to send legitimate looking emails with the resume of an individual claiming to have industry-specific skills. The resume contained malicious code that victims could inadvertently download when they reviewed the document.

Antonio Pina-Reyez, 34, 2nd Avenue Lenoir City, was charged with DUI, Violation of Implied Consent, Evading Arrest, Simple Possession, Speed Limit, Driving on Revoked License, Financial Responsibility Law, and Driving on Roadway laned for Traffic.

Officer H. Wilkes LCPD, was traveling down Highway 321 passing Abbie Dr and observed a blue Chevrolet Silverado bearing Tennessee registration DLK-932 failing to maintain their lane. Officer activated his emergency lighting equipment at Taco Bell, in attempt to conduct a traffic stop on the vehicle. After activating his emergency lighting equipment the vehicle failed to yield. Officer was able to pace the vehicle going 60 in a 40 while failing to yield to emergency lighting equipment. After a short pursuit the vehicle came to a stop at W 2nd Ave where a high risk traffic stop was conducted. Both subjects exited the vehicle and were apprehended. While speaking with the driver, who Office identified to be ANTONIO PINA REYES, Officer noticed a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from his person and also observed him stumbling. REYES was placed under arrest where he was then marandized at which time he admitted that he was intoxicated. Officer T. Eldridge LCPD, placed the passenger, later identi-fied as VICTOR EDUAR-DO VEGA GARCIA, into custody during the high risk traffic stop. Officer T. Eldridge observed a white rock like substance believed to be crack cocaine laying in plain

view on the passenger seat. Due to what Officer believe to be crack cocaine laying in plain view, a probable cause search was conducted on the vehicle. Officers located a one quart bottle of Corona that was completely empty, multiple beer bottle caps, spilt alcohol on the middle console, and a white rock like substance believed to be crack cocaine. The white rock like substance tested positive for crack cocaine through a field kit and weighed .25 grams. Both parties denied possession of the crack cocaine. REYES consented to a Field Sobriety Test, conducted by Officer T. Eldridge. REYES was transported to a nearby location to perform field sobriety. The field sobriety test produced the follow-ing results. REYES had a lack of smooth pursuit, a distinct nystagmus at maximum deviation, and the onset of a nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes indicating to all six clues during the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus. Reyes formed an improper turn during the walk and turn resulting in only one clue. During the one leg stand, REYES lost his balance, began hopping on one leg, and stopped counting out loud during the test before being told to do so. Following the conclusion of the test, Officer T. Eldridge determined REYES to be intoxicated. and under the influence of alcohol and was charged with Driving Under the Influence. The vehicle was towed by MoneyMakers. Both subjects were transported to Loudon County Jail without incident.




