Paula Andrew, 52, Nichols Road Lenoir City, was charged with Aggravated Burglary, Theft of Property.

Deborah Mills, 56, Nichols Road Lenoir City, was charged with Aggravated Burglary, anf Theft of Property.

Deputy Eric Curtis LCSO, was dispatched to an officer investigation at Nichols Rd in Lenoir City, TN. Earlier that day, Deputy and CID had responded to a deceased male at that same address, which had been reported by Deborah Mills and Paula Andrews. Upon arrival, Deputy found that the house was unsecured, and it had been locked when Deputy left the scene previously. Upon entering the residence, Deputy discovered that several pill bottles were missing. Deputy spoke with the neighbors at and provided them with

statement forms, and they claimed that the same women that reported the death had entered his residence approximately 30 minutes after deputies left the scene. Deputy spoke with the victim's wife, and his son, via phone on body camera. Wife stated that no one had been authorized to enter the residence. The son stated that victim phone had access to his Ring door cameras and provided the passcode for the phone. Deputy located the phone inside the secured residence, and reviewed the footage from that day.

At 1741, the two females that Deputy had spoken with earlier could be seen walking through the front yard. Debra Mills entered the residence while Paula Andrews sat outside. At 1742, Paula could be seen speaking with the neighbors as they walked down the street. At 1759,

Debra could be seen exiting the residence wearing a black jacket that she had not had upon entering. She handed Paula a white trash bag that appeared to be full, and the two left the area on foot.

Sgt. J Bowen arrived on scene to assist, and together we went to Nichols Rd to speak to Debra Mills and Paula Andrews. Upon arrival, they were allowed into the residence by an elderly male and found the two women to be asleep. Both were read

their Miranda Rights by Sgt. Bowen and asked about entering the house. Mills admitted to entering the house after first claiming that she had seen two others do so. Mills and Andrews were detained and transported to the Loudon County Detention Center and placed on Investigative Hold per Lt. C Cosner 940. The residence was resecured by request of the deceased's family. This did occur in Loudon County, TN.

campaign. The voters elected Davis in a close one by 255 votes. Challengers Paul Curtis received one vote more on election day but it wasnt enough to overcome the 254 votes during early voting and by absentee ballot. Third place went to Marty Ward of Loudon.

The commission race was a heated one in three districts particularly. The voters received numerous flyers sent out in support of Julia Hurley in the 2nd District, Eddie Simpson in the 5th District, and Mark Matlock in the 6th District. The flyers were paid for by a builders group of Knoxville and as we all know when Knoxville puts their nose in Loudon County it is to do all they can to either make us look bad or try to take from us as they have for decades with the utilities. The message received on these three candidates one

of which was an incumbent were handily defeated in each of their districts. The voters sent a clear message to those who they cast their vote for and that is they do not want to be overdeveloped like Knoxville and surrounding areas and that growth needs to be controlled. Incumbent Matt Tinker was defeated as well by Rosemary Hines Quillen in a close one by only 33 votes. Julia Hurley the other 2nd District Incumbent got the worst lashing after being soundly defeated by nearly 3-1. The first District will have new faces due to the lovely Kelly Brewster not running for re-election new comer Chase Coleman will fill her seat after garnering over 900 votes in a three way race and incumbent David Meers was defeated as well by new comer William Geames.

In the 5th District new comer David Ball was defeated by long time incum-

bent Harold Duff and local resident Pat Hunter came in third. Duff received over 1000 votes. The other seat in the 5th District pitted the most opposite two candidates to ever be on the ballot. Retiring Road Superintendant Eddie Simpson took on Van Shaver and despite his popularity as Road Superintendant was handily defeated after the flyers from Knoxville started hitting the mailboxes in his district. Simpson was beaten by over 600 votes with Shaver receving over 1400 to retain his seat.

In the 6th District Adam Waller defeated Mark Matlock 2-1 and will retain his seat on the commission. Matlock was also involved in the Knoxville support group and flyers hit mailboxes in his district which contributed to his defeat as well.

Tammy Gallaher will be the next Register of Deeds as she defeated Rick Arp 2-1 garnering over 6000 votes. Billy Pickel handily defeated his opposition nearly 2-1 as well and will be the new Loudon County Road Superintendant after the general election.

Newcomer Melissa Browder handily defeated Larry Brown for school board in the 5th District.

A Write In Campaign for Amy Langley for the office of County Court Clerk was to no avail despite receiving nearly 1000 write in votes she was not a qualified write in candidate for the primary however she will be elegible to be elected if she receives enough write in votes in the general election in August.

A Special Thanks needs to go to Susan Harrison who is the Director of Elections for Loudon County and her staff. They get the job done in such a professional manner. Next time you are down that way just pop in and say thanks for your hard work. They deserve it.






