Patricia Estep, 35, Nelson Street Philadelphia, was charged with Contributing to the Delinquency of a Minor, and Child Abuse or Neglect Endangerment.

Deputy W. Jenkins LCSO, was working my assigned post as a School Resource Officer at Loudon High School when Deputy was summoned to the main office in reference to an intoxicated juvenile female. When Deputy arrived he was informed that the juvenile was sent to the nurses office from her class because she could not stay awake and was showing other signs of impairment. Deputy was also informed that The school nurse evaluated the juvenile and came to suspect she was impaired. Deputy then made contact with juvenile who had slurred, slow speech and bloodshot eyes. Juvenile consented and performed sobriety testing. Juvenile performed poorly on the tests and showed signs of cannabis intoxication. Based on Deputy training, experience, and the totality of the circumstances the juvenile appeared in a public place under the influence of an intoxicating substance to the degree that she may have been endangered or endangered others. Deputy place the juvenile in custody, transported her to the Loudon County Juvenile Shelter, and filed a juvenile petition against her for public intoxication. This did happen in Loudon County Tn.

After the arrest of the invenile, Deputy C. Lane was dispatched to Nelson Street in Philadelphia to notify Patricia Estep, the juvenile legal guardian, that the juvenile was being held at the invenile shelter. Mrs. Estep told Deputy Lane that she was missing her "pen" and thought that juvenile may have it. Deputy Lane asked Mrs. Estep what kind of pen she was talking about to which she replied that it was a "delta 3" pen. Through my training and experience Deputy knew Delta 8 to be an intoxicating cannabis derivative that is illegal for minors to possess. It should be noted that Mrs. Estep choose not to call the school or law enforcement to report her suspicion that the juvenile had her delta 8 pen until she was being advised that the juvenile was in trouble. It should also be noted that the juvenile has been in trouble multiple times for having illicit substances at school. Mrs. Estep would be aware of juvenile pattern of possessing substances she is not allowed to have, but did not take adequate measures to keep her Delta 8 pen away from her. Based on the totality of the circumstances Mrs. Estep knowingly neglected the juvenile, so as to adversely affect the child's health and welfare. Mrs. Estep also contributed to the delinquency of the juvenile, by abetting the iuvenile in the commission of an act of delinquency by allowing her access to her Delta 8 pen



Based upon this investigation, in September 2022, the Fentress County Grand Jury indicted Patricia Dishmon one count of theft of services over \$1,000, and one count of official misconduct.

"The city must enforce its utility disconnect policies for all accounts, follow its approved leave policies, document and create a policy for food purchases, and discontinue the use of signature stamps."

Current members of Friends of the Library will be the first to shop the sale during Members Preview Day from 3:307:00 pm on Thursday, September 29. Memberships can be purchased online or renewed at the door. The sale will be open to the public Friday and Saturday from 10 am-5 pm, with Saturday designated as half price day.
