CDC Warns of E. Coli outbreak linked to raw milk cheese

A CDC food safety alert regarding a multistate outbreak of E. coli infections has been posted: <https://www.cdc.gov/ecoli/raw-milk-cheese-2-24/index.html>

Key Points:

Ten people infected with the outbreak strain of E. coli have been reported from four states. Four people have been hospitalized and one person

developed hemolytic uretic syndrome. This is a serious condition that can cause kidney failure. No deaths have been reported.

Of the 6 people who remembered the details of the raw milk cheese they ate, all reported eating RAW FARM brand raw cheddar cheese.

CDC advises people not to eat, sell, or serve RAW FARM brand raw cheddar cheese

while the investigation is ongoing.

RAW FARM LLC has agreed to recall products and is working with FDA.

What People and Businesses Should Do:

Do not sell or serve RAW FARM brand raw cheddar cheese.

Wash and sanitize items and surfaces that may have come

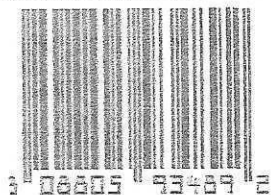

DUI

Willie Alexander, 48, Edith Lane Lenoir City, was charged with DUI, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Deputy Watson LCSO, was conducting routine patrol on Hines Valley Road near Hwy 70. Deputy observed a white pickup truck traveling toward his patrol vehicle and entered his lane and drove toward him head-on before swerving back into the appropriate lane. Deputy turned around and upon catching up to the vehicle, observed the vehicle continue swaying in the lane and also crossed the yellow center line. Deputy initiated a traffic stop and the vehicle took a wide right turn onto Edith Lane and failed to stay on the right side of the roadway. Deputy approached the driver's side window and made contact with Mr. Willie Alexander 3rd in the driver seat of the vehicle. Mr. Alexander had bloodshot watery eyes and was unsure where he was coming from when asked. Deputy detected a strong odor of an intoxicant coming from inside the vehicle. Mr. Alexander admitted to having two shots before driving the vehicle. Deputy asked Mr. Alexander to exit

his vehicle and walk back to the front of my patrol vehicle. Mr. Alexander acknowledged but instead, walked to the rear of his vehicle and placed his hands on the tailgate. Deputy then asked Mr. Alexander a second time to walk to the front of his patrol vehicle. Mr. Alexander appeared to be unsteady on his feet while walking from the back of his vehicle to the front of my vehicle. While speaking to Mr. Alexander in front of his patrol vehicle, the deputy detected a strong odor of an intoxicant emitting from his breathe. Mr. Alexander refused SFSTs/ARIDE testing and was placed in custody due to suspicion of driving under the influence. Mr. Alexander was read implied consent and refused to provide a sample. Mr. Alexander was transported to the Loudon County Jail without incident. This did occur in Loudon County, Tennessee.

Gabriel Dinardi, 43, McKinney Avenue Lenoir City, was charged with Domestic Assault.

Officer Farmer LCPD, was dispatched to McKinney Ave in reference to an officer investigation. The complainant victim, advised Central Dis-

patch that her husband had kicked her out of the residence after being violent towards her. Officer arrived on scene and made contact with the victim who informed him that her husband, identified as Gabriel Dinardi, had left the scene prior to the officer arrival. While speaking with the victim, she advised that Mr. Dinardi believes she is cheating on him and became aggressive towards her. The victim stated that she was in bed when Mr. Dinardi came into the room, demanding that she tell him the truth, or he would "beat the f@#\$ out of her." The victim stated that this altercation

placed her in fear, so much so that she did not move as to not further antagonize Mr. Dinardi. Mr. Dinardi then left the residence and was later located at the Lenoir City Schools Central Office, E Broadway, with the assistance of Life 360. Upon the officer arrival at the Lenoir City Schools Central Office, the officer made contact with Mr. Dinardi and placed him into custody for Domestic Assault. The victim agreed to write a statement and was advised of her options. Mr. Dinardi was transported to the Loudon County Jail without further incident.

Indecent

Gary Sergent, 38, Brick Creek Road Kingston, was charged with Indecent Exposure.

Officer with the Lenoir City Police were dispatched to Food City in reference to an Indecent Exposure incident. Upon arrival, the officer made contact with both victims. The suspect had already left the scene. When interviewed, victim 1 she stated that she works for Door Dash and at approximately "7:15 pm" tonight she and her daughter were sitting in her Honda CRV "in the Food City parking lot and a young

male pulled up beside" them "with his penis in his hand and shaking it". "My window was up so I don't know if he said anything or not." She further added that "about a week prior to this" earlier in the day, around 2:00 or 2:30 PM "the same male pulled up beside her and asked if I could possibly help him with something and I said probably not". The only thing that she could see on that occasion was his arm movement. During tonight's incident she was able to write down the vehicle tag on his black sedan, TN 824BHXQ. She then called Loudon County

Sheriff detective Charlie Costner, who was able to come up with a possible suspect, Gary Brandon Sergent, W/M. A DL photo of Sergent does match the description of the suspect provided by victim 1. She described him as a "white male, mid 20's, with dark hair and beard". She could not remember what he was wearing, but did say that she saw his penis in his hand and that he was "shaking it". Officer did not show the victim a DL photo of the suspect. The victim also does not know if her special needs daughter, who was sitting in the back seat of the Honda CRV, saw anything

and that she would not understand even if she did. Victim 1 said that she could identify the suspect if seen again. Victim 1 stated that detective Costner told her to tell us that the suspect's vehicle had a Flock hit almost everyday for the past 30 days around "2:30pm" coming into Lenoir City. Officer C. Sparks went into the Food City to see if a Gary Sergent worked there but was told that he does not. The victim was parked in the parking lot of the Food City closest to Wendy's. This incident occurred in Lenoir City, Loudon County, TN. TCA 39-13-511 Indecent Exposure.

Call your healthcare provider right away if you have any severe E. coli symptoms.

Wash surfaces and containers that may have touched these products using hot soapy water or a dishwasher.

E. coli Symptoms:

Most people infected with Shiga toxin-producing E. coli experience severe stomach cramps, diarrhea (often bloody), and vomiting.

Symptoms usually start 3 to 4 days after swallowing the bacteria.

Most people recover without treatment after 5 to 7 days.

Some people may develop serious kidney problems (hemolytic uremic syndrome, also called HUS) and would need to be hospitalized.

Clues that someone is developing HUS include decreased frequency of urina-

tion, feeling very tired, and losing pink color in cheeks and inside the lower eyelids.
