

Davis House Officials Used Credit Cards for Questionable and Unsupported Expenses

More than \$250,000 in unsupported charges by nonprofit serving child abuse victims

An investigation by the Tennessee Comptroller's Office has revealed that officials at the Davis House Child Advocacy Center made questionable and unsupported credit card charges totaling at least \$250,709.78. The Center is a non-profit organization that during the investigative period.

Christopher Neely, 37, Price Road Lenoir City, was charged with, Simple Possession, and Poss. of Drug Para.

Deputy B. McCall, along with Deputy J. Willis LCSO, responded to Price Road in reference to an unwanted guest. Upon arrival, the deputies was met at the front door by the complainant who stated that her grandson, identified as the offender Christopher Neely, was "stoned. The complainant allowed deputies into the residence, at which time they observed Mr. Neely sitting in a recliner in the living room. He exhibited widened eyes, pinpoint pupils, and very slow, slurred speech. His arms and feet were raised. and he was unable to form complete sentences. The deputy asked Christopher if he had taken any substances and, if so, when. He replied, "No."

At that time, the complainant stated that she had found some drugs on the couch where Mr. Neely had been sleeping. She then handed the deputy a small clear plastic baggie containing a light gray powdery substance. Deputy Willis and McCall asked Mr. Neely what the substance was, and after a few attempts, he stated that it was heroin. Given Mr. Neely's current condition, the presence of narcotics on the scene, and for officer safety, the deputy conducted a search of his person. In his right pocket, the deputy located a red cut straw containing a gray residue and a small plastic bag with a dark gray powdery substance. Priority EMS responded to the scene, evaluated Mr. Neely, and medically cleared him. The derputy then placed Christopher Allen Neely under arrest for Possession of Schedule I Drugs and

Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, and transported him to the Loudon County Detention Center. As the deputy was leaving the residence, the complainant brought out two additional small plastic baggies, one containing a light gray powdery substance and the other contained a light green powdery substance and surrendered them to the denuty. Upon arrival at the jail. the deputy read Mr. Neely his Miranda Warning, which he acknowledged and agreed to waive. The deputy asked him whether the heroin surrendered by the complainant belonged to him. He responded, "It doesn't belong to them." The substances were tested by Loudon County Narcotics Lt. Ezell via TruNarc scans 2924, 2925 and tested positive for fentanyl/methamphetamine. The substances weighed approximately 1.5 grams in total. This incident occurred in Loudon County. Tennessee.

served children and families in crisis across Williamson, Hickman, Lewis, and Perry counties.

Davis House receives funding from government grants, donations, and fundraisers. For most years between 2020 and 2024, the Center operated at a financial


deficit, maintained high credit card balances, and incurred interest and late fees. Investigators found that officials failed to maintain supporting documentation for more than \$250,000 in charges made on two credit cards. These included charges at upscale restaurants, retail stores, entertainment venues, and purchases of alcohol purportedly for events, training, and other expenses of the Center.

Investigators were also able to substantiate that the former executive director used one of the credit cards for at least \$345.55 in personal purchases, including charges made during a Florida conference held at a Walt Disney World resort. He later sent a check to repay a portion of his personal credit card charges.

"It is essential that nonprofit organizations with public funding operate transparently and within clearly defined financial policies," said Comptroller Mumpower. "Proper oversight by the Board of Directors and documentation help prevent wasteful spending, protect the organization's mission, and promote public trust."

The results of this investigation have been communicated to the Offices of the District Attorneys General of the 21st and 32nd Judicial Districts.

without incident.





WATER SYSTEM FLUSHING PROGRAM

The Lenoir City Utilities Board (LCUB) and Lenoir City Fire Department will be conducting our semi-annual water distribution system wide flushing program per Tennessee Department of Environment & Conservation Water Quality Control Requirements. The Flushing Program will occur for LCUB customers on Sunday, June 1, 2025, from 6:00 p.m. until 2:00 a.m. thru Saturday, June 7, 2025, until 3:00 p.m. The program goals are to identify problems in the water system and ultimately have them corrected. When fire hydrants are flowed, iron deposits in the water lines become agliated. This may cause a brown discoloration to the water in the area which is being flushed. This condition is only temporary and will normally correct itself in a number of hours. During this period of flushing, LCUB recommends that you flow your cold water prior to use to determine if there is any discoloration. While the water is still safe for consumption, we recommend not laundering white clothes without first testing the water for discoloration. If your water is discolored, it will clear up on its own under normal usage over a period of time. It is also best to limit the use of your hot water until the water flows clear as this will keep the iron deposits from going into your water heater. You may also notice a drop in water pressure during these times; however, the water pressure should return to normal within a short period of time. If you continue to experience difficulty with your water pressure or continue to have discoloration of water on Monday, June 9, 2025, please contact LCUB at 1-844-OUR-LCUB (687-5282) to report the problem.
